Leadership Program

Stay Work Play is now accepting applications for its 2025 Rising Stars Leadership Program, a leadership development initiative tailored to young people across a myriad of industries from February through June, according to a press release.

The program consists of six in-person sessions that focuses on leadership skills, community engagement and fostering ambition for the Granite State. Tuition is \$2,000 and discounts are available for Stay Work Play Board of Advisor members, according to the release. Applications are due Friday, Jan. 24. In a statement, Corinne Benfield, Executive Director of Stay Work Play NH said "the Rising Stars Leadership Program exemplifies our mission to elevate and empower the incredible young people that call the 603 home. By investing in this program, we are ensuring that New Hampshire has strong ambassadors who can help shape New Hampshire to be an attractive and vibrant place to live, work, and play."

Here, fishy, fishy, fishy

According to a press release, the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department stocks trout during the fall to bolster the winter ice fishery for winter anglers.

Fish and Game has listed on its website links for different bodies of water that are open year-round as well as rules for these water bodies with special regulations included in the New Hampshire Freshwater Fishing Digest, which is also available from license agents, according to the same release.

The following lakes and ponds were stocked with trout during the fall of 2024 and are open to ice fishing: Akers Pond in Errol. Beaver Pond in Woodstock, Bow Lake in Strafford, Cedar Pond in Milan, Big Diamond Pond in Stewartstown (opens Wednesday, Jan. 1), Higher Ground Pond in Wentworth, Highland Lake in Andover, Hildreth Pond in Warren, Little Dan Hole Pond in Ossipee, Manning Lake in Gilmanton, Martin Meadow Pond in Lancaster, Mascoma Lake in Enfield, Mirror Lake in Woodstock, Newfound Lake in Bristol, Ogontz Lake in Lyman, Pearl Lake in Lisbon, Perch Pond in Lisbon, Pleasant Lake in Deerfield, Streeter Pond in Sugar Hill, Sunapee Lake in Newbury, Tewksbury Pond in Grafton, Webster Lake in Franklin, White Lake in Tamworth, and Winnisquam Lake in Laconia. There are additional ones not listed here.

In a statement, Fish and Game's Inland Fisheries Program Supervisor John Magee said that "the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department's hatcheries stock post-spawn brook and brown trout into selected water bodies that do not have a closed season before winter. These fish can range from 2 to 3 pounds each. Numbers, dates, and stocking locations vary annually. I would encourage anglers of all skill levels to take advantage of this season's stocked opportunities throughout New

Hampshire when weather conditions are favorable and once the ice is safe."

In another statement, he said that "The Granite State's rivers and streams open to fishing on Jan. 1, and there are some quality fish to be caught in some of the tailwater fisheries such as the Newfound River. When water levels are drawn down on larger lakes for the fall, prize-sized fish often drop down below dams, creating opportunities for savvy winter anglers. This winter's free fishing day is Jan. 18, so why not try your luck through the ice this year."



More access to education

According to a press release, New Hampshire's public higher education systems have created more than 100 direct pathways designed to help students move smoothly from associate degree programs offered by New Hampshire's community colleges to bachelor's degree programs offered by the University System.

This collaboration between the Community College System of New Hampshire (CCSNH) and the University System of New Hampshire (USNH) makes it easier for students to continue their education, earn subsequent degrees more efficiently, and fill critical jobs in New Hampshire's workforce faster and with less debt, according to the release.

Students currently enrolled in



or planning to enter any of New Hampshire's seven community colleges can now follow clear, structured pathways that lead directly to bachelor's degrees at Keene State College, Plymouth State University, or the University of New Hampshire (UNH), which includes UNH Durham, Manchester and the College of Professional Studies Online, according to the release.

In a statement, USNH Chancellor Catherine Provencher said "these pathways give students the confidence to pursue their educational goals with assurance that we have taken steps to align programs to help manage time and cost. This collaboration makes it easier for New Hampshire residents to stay in the state, earn a degree, and strengthen our workforce."

The CCSNH has trained advisors available at each community college and USNH sponsors a centralized Outreach and Enrollment Center that assists with applications, financial aid resources, and other support services available to students in both systems, according to the same release.

The state of business Bright spots and challenges

Michael Skelton is the president & CEO of the Business Industry Association, New Hampshire's statewide Chamber of Commerce. He spoke with the Hippo about business in the Granite State. Visit biaofnh.com for more information.

What has been the biggest challenge for businesses in New Hampshire in 2024? The workforce shortage con-

tinues to be the biggest challenge, and the insufficient supply of housing at all levels is one of the most significant causes. Virtually all industries are affected, but we are particularly concerned about the impact on vital economic sectors experiencing strong job growth such as manufacturing, life sciences and high-tech.

What do you see as the biggest challenges in 2025?

BIA's priority for 2025 is supporting legislation and policies to spur new housing development, increase affordability and help build our future workforce. Over 27 percent of our workforce is age 55 or older, highest among the states, and New Hampshire faces the retirement of an estimated 200,000 workers in coming years. It's essential to allow more higher-density housing of all types, but particularly starter homes, while streamlining municipal and state approval processes for new housing developments. Recruiting and retaining the next generation of workers depends on significant action this legislative session as it will take years for housing spurred by new policies to be built.

What are the brightest spots of the economy?

The Granite State has incredible opportunities with the burgeoning biofabrication and life sciences sector and growing advanced manufacturing sector. A strong manufacturing sector is critical to economic success. Manufacturing's impact ripples throughout the economy from local jobs to research and development that drives innovation and increases productivity. The life sciences and manufacturing sectors will create additional opportunities in our high-tech industry and educational system and growth will spread throughout our economy, creating thousands of high-paying careers.

What are specific advantages in New Hampshire?

U.S. News & World Report named New Hampshire as the second-best state to live in for 2024, citing our safety, fiscal stability and economy. New Hampshire

continues to see economic growth and has one of the lowest state unemployment rates in the nation. We also benefit from New Hampshire's business and political leaders who are dedicated to working together to solve the challenges and make our state an even better place to live and do business.

Which businesses are on the rise or do you expect to do well in the state in 2025?

As the New Hampshire affiliate of the National Association of Manufacturers, BIA is proud to promote a strong manufacturing sector. More than 1,100 businesses employ over 42,000 people, 5.6 percent of the state's total employment, and the sector is growing, adding over 1,000 jobs from 2017 to 2022. These are well-paying careers. Average annual earnings for an advanced manufacturing worker in New Hampshire are \$111,728, far exceeding the \$82,673 average for all industries.

Is there anything else about New Hampshire's economy you would like to speak on?

The state must continue efforts to lower the cost of electricity. New Hampshire's industrial electricity rates last fall were 84 percent higher than the U.S. average, and commercial rates were nearly 50 percent higher. These uncompetitive prices raise the cost of doing business and increase the risk of losing companies to less expensive regions. — Zachary Lewis

Summer Olympics: The U.S. earned the most gold, men's basketball beat France for the gold, and the women's soccer team regained the top rung in their game worldwide behind, of all people, **Dennis Rodman**'s daughter **Trinity**.

Chiefs First to Win Repeat Since NE in 2003-04: After down goes SF for their third, get ready, Patriots fans, because with Patrick Mahomes not even 30 yet and the league's best coach, Andy Reid, possibly around for another 10 seasons, six or (gulp) more SB wins are not out of the question.

Dodgers Destroy Yanks 4-1 in Series: It had it all: big stars in **Shohei Ohtani** and **Aaron Judge**, the L.A.-N.Y. TV markets and their history of 11 previous World Series meetings. But with four homers, 12 RBI and a walk-off grand slam to win Game 1 **Freddie Freeman** stole the show as L.A. won in a walk. Judge put up similar numbers to what **Dave Winfield** had in 1981 that led **George Steinbrenner** to mock his star as "Mr. May."

UConn Men Win Again: A feel-good story of their being the first to win back-to-back college basketball team titles since Florida in 2006-07 and coach **Dan Hurley** shunning big bucks from the Lakers to stay and go for three.

Belichick Gets Fired: A once un-imaginable ending to his reign in Foxboro. Got it thanks to horrendous drafting, the lunkhead move of putting incompetent **Matt Patricia** in charge of the 2023 offense and his prickly stubbornness finally catching up with him. Which gave us all the definitive answer to "Was it Brady or Belichick?"

The opposite of dry reading

The Concord Public Library (45 Green St., Concord, 225-8670, concordnh.gov/1983/Library) found itself very, very damp, after a ceiling leak during the night on Sunday, Dec.14. As reported in a Dec. 16 online article by the Concord Monitor, water had come down "through the ceiling in the children's room and pooled down on the first floor." On Monday, Dec. 15, the Library posted on its Facebook page, "We have sprung a leak! Please excuse the mess as we dry out. The Main Floor is open for public use with the exception of the adult fiction collection. The Children's Room and Lower Lounge will be closed for the day. We will be happy to get materials for you from the children's and adult fiction collections." The Monitor quoted Library Director Todd Fabian. "A few hundred library items were affected by the leak," he said, "but how many books are a loss won't be known for a few days."

QOL score: -1

Comment: According to the Monitor's story, the Library has had "a few sizable leaks of this kind" in recent years. Last year the room housing its computer servers was flooded, and the Concord Room, which houses the Library's historical archives, was flooded before that.

An astronomical achievement

As reported in a Dec. 19 online article by WMUR, a team of students from Nashua has won a competition to have an experiment performed on the International Space Station. "Team Hydra" from the Academy for Science and Design wanted to look more closely at the effects of precipitation in microgravity. As explained by WMUR, "The experiment will analyze how calcium chloride and sodium carbonate interact in space, with potential applications for water filtration systems on Earth and in space exploration."

Comment: Tech company Space Tango will implement and monitor the students' experiment in space sometime in the next year. The Academy's team competed against 10 other teams from across the region.

The cost of dog ownership can be ruff

A recent study by online discount platform WeThrift has ranked U.S. states by how much the residents in each spend on their dogs. According to a Dec. 18 press release, "New Hampshire ranks as the eighth most [expensive] state for pet owners, with a total cost of \$1,883.38, 12.36% above the average annual cost across all states." According to the study, some factors that contribute to the state's pet spending include the cost of pet food ("an annual cost of \$761.60, 11.54% above the national average"), veterinary care ("\$75.32, which is 8.55% above the average") and vaccinations ("The state's annual dog vaccine cost is \$233.46, which is 4.88% above the average").

QOL score: -1

Comments: The study found that Massachusetts has the highest dog spending in the U.S., at \$2,275.97. The most affordable state dog-maintainance-wise is Kansas, with yearly spending of \$1,403.40.

We worked on showcasing our maximalist curatorial approach with concurrent themes that reflect, express and relate to the larger conversations in artists' worlds and how they mirror one another "



Dear Car Talk: I am a 72-vear-old woman who drives a 2011 VW Jetta with a 5-speed manual transmission. I LOVE my car! Eventually, I will need a new car and

am thinking about a hybrid SUV. I have test-driven a Honda CR-V (liked it) and a Tovota Corolla Cross (too small). When we looked at a Kia Sportage, I was surprised by my visceral, negative reaction to the rotary gear shift dial. My husband was shocked when I told him that was a dealbreaker. I told him I couldn't go from a manual gear shift to a flimsy little twist knob. What is your opinion of the rotary gear shifts? What would be the best hybrid SUV for me? — Nancy

I don't particularly care for rotary gear shifters, personally, Nancy. But mechanically, or in terms of durability, there's nothing wrong with them.

Automatic transmissions used to be shifted by cables. You'd move the shift lever from Park to Drive, and the lever would actually pull a cable attached to the transmission. But now, automatic transmissions

are all electronically controlled. So all a lever more useful. shifter has to do is send a signal to the transmission controller.

That means you no longer need to use a lever that moves a cable. You can use almost any kind of switch. And, in fact, we are seeing a variety of shift controllers now. I've driven Hondas and Lincolns with push-button selectors. And I've shifted Chryslers and Hyundais with rotary controllers.

And, mechanically, they all work fine. The advantage of these compact controllers — besides styling distinction — is they take up a lot less space inside the cabin. That means the designers can use that extra space for things customers might want morelike storage bins, phone charging pads or Italian espresso makers.

What I don't like about the newer controllers is that they require you to look at them to use them. I can put an old-style automatic shifter into the right gear with my eyes closed. Or, more importantly, with my eyes on the road. That becomes useful when you need to shift quickly back and forth between, say Drive and Reverse. So, if you're making a multi-point U-turn in traffic or you're navigating into a tight parking space, I find the



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

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JOHN FLADD COOKS Rum Cake

This recipe is adapted from one that was published in a Bacardi advertisement from 1976. It holds up.

1 cup (133 g) finely chopped roasted, salted pecans 1 box (375 g) yellow

cake mix 1 3.4-ounce package

instant vanilla pudding mix

- 4 eggs ¹/₂ cup (225 g) milk
- ¹/₂ cup (1 stick) butter ¹/₂ cup (225 g) dark or black rum

Preheat oven to 325°F.

In a small saucepan, brown the butter: Over low heat, melt the butter, and stir or swirl almost constantly until it turns brownish gold, a tawny color, not unlike a lion. Remove it from the heat, and let it cool to room temperature. Strain it to remove the milk solids you've so cleverly rendered out.

Use a large spoonful of butter to grease the inside of a Bundt pan. If you have experienced the heartbreak of a Bundt cake not coming cleanly out of its pan, and ripping itself into pieces; if you are intimidated by Bundt pans; if you have young children you do not want to expose to intemperate language — there is a solution: absurd amounts of butter. Wash your hands, and really slather the butter on, hitting every corner and crevice. Make certain you give special attention to the central column. If you feel like you have buttered it enough, you need to add more. Obsessive over-indulgence is the order of the day here.

Sprinkle your finely chopped pecans across the bottom of the Bundt pan. This will be the top of your cake.

In a large bowl, combine all the other ingredients, including your browned butter. Stir the mixture until there are no dry bits or lumps, then pour it into your waiting Bundt pan. Use a silicone spatula to transfer all of it.

Thump the pan on your countertop with authority. Give the cake batter a good, hard stare to let it know that you aren't fooling around, then give it a couple more solid thumps. This will make sure that all the batter has been seated into your carefully buttered crevices.



(The pan's crevices, that is. Yours are your own business, and beyond the purview of a cake recipe.)

Bake the cake for about an hour, or until the center reaches 200°F. Remove it from the oven and let it cool in the pan for 15 or 20 minutes.

Invert the cake onto a plate. I like to rise up on my toes, then jerk

the pan and plate downward with some force. You should be rewarded with a soft thump.

Carefully remove the Bundt pan to make certain everything turned out well (literally, in this case), then replace the pan on the cake, and re-invert it, so that you are looking at the bottom of the cake.

With a wooden skewer, stab the cake 100 times, then set it aside while you make some rum syrup.

Rum Syrup

¹/₂ cup (1 stick) butter

- ¹/₄ cup water
- 1 cup (198 g) sugar

Another $^{1\!\!/}_{2}$ cup (225 g) dark or black rum

In a small saucepan, probably the same one you used earlier, bring the butter, water and sugar to a boil. Boil it for another five minutes, then remove it from heat. Let it cool a few minutes, then stir in the rum.

Slowly pour about half the rum syrup over the cake. Give it a minute or two to absorb into the cake through all those holes you poked, then pour the rest of the syrup over it.

Set the cake aside for an hour or two to completely integrate the rum syrup, then re-re-invert it onto a serving plate.

Rum cake goes exceptionally well with not-very-sweet coffee or tea. The sweetness and moisture of the cake makes a clean contrast with a hot beverage. The rumminess makes a good contrast to the hard work and disappointment in your life.

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
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
Kristian Montgomery and the Winterkill Band, Prophets of the Apocalypse (self-released)



When last we left Cape Cod-based bandleader Montgomery I was on the verge of anointing him the Tom Petty of New England, but that feels a little inadequate; local achievement is generally regarded by the public as almost meaningless in comparison to national success no matter the level of enthusiasm from hometown wags. I mean, he's been nominated for some pretty notable awards, including a (nationally renowned) Josie and a Boston Music Award in 2021, which somehow led to his having beef with the committee owing to his disgust for their lack of recognition for blue-collar artists. He's a rebel,

this guy, and has a ton of working-class cred. In this EP he blends Petty with Florida Georgia Line in the timely blue-collar protest song "American Fire" and country-fies early Kings Of Leon in "Leaving Texas." He's a legitimate badass, folks; I literally had to troll him into letting me hear this record in advance, a very rare thing with hungry local bands. Please support this man. A+—*Eric W. Saeger*

Adam Birnbaum, Preludes (self-released)



This one's a year old now, but the fellow who's helping to promote this world-class pianist is trying to break into the upper echelons of the music business, and he's a nice guy, so here goes. This album spotlights a piano, upright bass and percussion trio taking on a formidable set of Johann Sebastian Bach's compositions, along the way adding elements of jazz, Latin, swing and straight eighth-note, taking liberties with feel and improvisation. There are YouTube videos of these cool customers going at it, and it's quite a sight; Matt Clohesy playing his bass after a showy, Jaco Pastorius fashion; percussionist Keita

Ogawa looking quite comfortable and Birnbaum appearing as if he'd literally invented the piano he's playing. "Prelude in Db Major" bops right along most ambitiously, all but stripped of its classical nature; "Prelude in C Major" retains much of the latter but does eventually settle into a light, piano-bar groove. Terrific stuff. A+ —*Eric W. Saeger*

PLAYLIST

A seriously abridged compendium of recent and future CD releases

• At this writing, Genius.com tells me there are only two new music albums scheduled for traditional Friday release this week, on Dec. 27, two days after the big pagan holiday, whatever it's called. No, I'm kidding, I know it's called "Christmas," but according to a popular meme that made the rounds this holiday season, Christians once actually tried to get rid of Christmas at one time, wouldn't that have been a bummer? No, seriously, according to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts' website, "In 1659, the Massachusetts Bay Colony enacted a law called Penalty for Keeping Christmas. The notion was that such 'festivals as were superstitiously kept in other countries' were a 'great dishonor of God and offence of others.' Anyone found celebrating Christmas by failing to work, 'feasting, or any other way ... shall pay for every such offence five shillings [This would be about \$48 today]." The Commonwealth eventually came to realize what a dumb idea that was, and by 1681 all the witch-burning pilgrims could watch the Grinch again, but even today some musical artists couldn't care less if it was Christmas or National Possum Day or whatever, they insist on putting out albums. For example, there's Jorge Rivera-Herrans, a mildly popular playwright, composer, lyricist and actor from Dorado, Puerto Rico. His new record, Epic: The Ithaca Saga, is a po-faced concept album that was released on Christmas; it includes a song called "God Games" that's racked up more than six million views on YouTube. It comprises opera-based techno-driven nonsense that's actually kind of brilliant in a technical sense, and a lot of people like it, so I suppose there's a chance he'll someday become some sort of male version of Enya for Greek mythology wonks. I mean, I fully expect never to hear anything from him again unless I'm at a sci-fi convention or somesuch, but weird things happen all the time.

• Also on Christmas, K-pop band **2NE1** released a 15-track album titled *Welcome Back*, which commemorates their ongoing (four years and counting) tour of the same name. Their bouncy, brainless Lady Gaga-style stuff borrows from all sorts of international styles and features a lot of sexytime butt-dancing and all the other stuff that's been portending the collapse of Western civilization since 2005 or so.

• In normal album-release news, this Friday sees the release of the second album from **Harshmxjb** (real name Harsh Mishra), a musician from New Delhi, India. This feller is a typical underground culture-jammer, a 19-year-old who's been exploiting the open-door policy of Spotify, Apple Music and all the other music sites, uploading hiphop tunes like "Alone," in which he sings off-key, like a brain-damaged Usher, over a melancholy, non-awful piano-driven beat (that song actually got some love on Tik-Tok and YouTube).

• We'll wrap up the week with an album that's neither silly, performatively epic nor K-pop, a new one from singer **Robbie Williams**, whom you know from British boyband Take That, which was originally triangulated by conniving record company lizard-people as the U.K.'s answer to New Kids on the Block. That was a long time ago, of course; Williams has been a solo art-fraud since 1995, not that American audiences have paid much attention to him, but regardless, the new LP is *Better Man (Original Motion Picture Soundtrack)*. Given that the movie is about Williams' career, he was probably a good choice to soundtrack it; these things aren't difficult to figure out. —*Eric W. Saeger*

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POP CULTURE BOOKS

Time of the Child, by Niall Williams (Bloomsbury, 287 pages)

Irish noveliest Niall Williams' latest book is *Time of the Child*, which revisits the fictional town of Faha, where much lauded 2019 book *This is Happiness* and another Williams novel, *History of the Rain*, are set.

It is a holiday novel in that the events take place during the season of Advent and involve lots of holly and a child born under mysterious circumstances. But nothing is lost by reading it in January, and in fact, that timing is possibly better since *Time of the Child* is a slow-cooker of a book, best read at a leisurely pace. Nothing moves very quickly in Faha, where one of the residents is a dog named Harry whose favorite place to sleep is the middle of the road, requiring drivers to wait for the mutt to move, "in dogtime and untellable weariness," before they can proceed.

It is that sort of delightful detail that makes Williams such a pleasure to read.

The central characters in this story are a widowed doctor, Jack Troy, and his adult daughter Ronnie (for Veronica), who live at a pace that moves not much faster than the town dog. Troy is 59 and is pretty much going through the motions of life, having lost both his wife and another woman he had fallen in love with after his wife's passing. As Faha's only doctor, Troy has little time for despair, though; he is constantly beset with people bringing him their physical complaints, and those of others, everywhere he goes.

Ronnie is his faithful companion and professional assistant, the budding loves of her past unrealized and her two sisters having left town. ("Why would anyone want to live here? ... It's just rain and muck and beasts?" one sister had said.) Father and daughter dwell mostly in companionable silence as they go to Mass at the local Catholic church — where the pastor is slowly slipping into dementia in front of his congregation and they make house calls throughout the region, visits for which Troy may or may not be compensated.

Enter the child — an abandoned infant, seemingly lifeless, brought to Troy by a 12-year-old boy who found her by a church gate. Dr. Troy is able to resuscitate the baby, and he and Ronnie quickly become attached to her — observing his daughter care for the infant, the doctor realizes, "It was not second nature to her, it was first."

The presence of an infant changes everything in the household — Ronnie takes on a



glow foreign to her father, and in a particularly poignant scene, she watches her usually emotionless father dance to Sinatra holding the baby. "What had come over him was as old as life on earth — a pulsed response to another, outside of and even before the existence of reason, a prime and primal engagement that took its continuance from

the expression in the baby's features. She liked it! And that was everything."

They are reluctant to relinquish her to the state, which has a poor track record of taking care of children and the elderly (which is the same reason that Troy is so protective of the clearly failing priest), but they also know they cannot keep the child hidden in Faha, "the lid never stayed on a story."

And so, casting about desperately for a solution, Troy concocts a scheme to keep the child — the logistics of which also involve the doctor correcting a sin of his past — sending away a young man whom Ronnie had loved years ago. This man, named Noel Crowe, is now living in America, complicating things. (Readers of *This is Happiness* will recall Noel from that earlier book.)

Like Harry, the weary canine king of Faha blocking traffic in the street, Williams is in no hurry to get where he's going; the first half of *Time of the Child* is character development that can frustrate readers who want things to happen. It's not unusual for dialogue between characters to be interrupted by one or two pages of incidental information before Williams brings us back to the conversation, which a reader might have reasonably thought had ended.

It's not until the baby arrives more than a hundred pages in that the pace picks up, and then the narrative moves almost too quickly. But Williams knows what he's doing, and the richness of detail, which might seem unnecessary at times, bestows an intimacy with the characters that pays off — not only the father and daughter and priest, but other residents of the town, including the boy who finds the baby on the day of the town's Christmas fair, Jude Quinlan, and the adult twins that the townspeople had given up on identifying correctly, so they just combined their names and call both of them Tim-Tom.

It requires commitment to read *Time of the Child* — not only because you'll want to read slowly to savor the writing, but because for all practical purposes, you'll be a citizen of Faha when you're done, emotionally anyway. Which means you'll be reading *This is Happiness* and *History of the Rain* next not a bad way to while away the gloom of winter. **A**—*Jennifer Graham*

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Pop-you-lar A look at 2024 at the movies

I was sort of bummed out about the whole movie-going experience in 2024 and then I saw Wicked.

I'm not a Wicked person, in the sense of owning the cast album or having seen a stage production. And has there been too much Wicked everywhere with everything? Yes, totally. But this candy-colored musical brought something I felt was generally lacking in 2024: a fun time at the movies. Cynthia Erivo and Ariana Grande are a great team — both are solid with the songs, have good chemistry as an enemies-to-friends duo and are good at the tone of this fairy tale with darkness around the edges. It's a long movie but doesn't feel like a slog and it is worth putting on your shoes and silencing your phones to see this in a theater, where the colors and whimsy will get their proper scale. With the numbers of local movie screens dropping in 2024 (RIP to Chunky's theaters in Nashua and Pelham, Regal in Concord and AMC in Londonderry), it was good to feel excited about being in a theater. Wicked, which is still in theaters, will get a release of a special sing-along version on Dec. 25.

But *Wicked* wasn't the only thing making me feel upbeat about movies.

• The "Good Riddance (Time of Your Life)" Award for making me feel positive things about a superhero franchise: That would go to *Deadpool* + *Wolverine* (for rent and streaming on Disney+). If I think about the whole Ryan Reynolds thing or watch extended trailers for this movie, I feel sort of exhausted. But in the midst of the movie, watching Deadpool and Wolverine/Reynolds and Hugh Jackman, both just so game, I kind of couldn't help having fun. Also, I enjoyed the goofy 20th Century Studios-Marvel cameos and how that universe was egg-white-foam folded into the Marvel Cinematic Universe proper. I even had a moment of "aw, cute" during the credits, which used the aforementioned song, to give that world its sendoff.

• The exact right kind of dumb: Recently, I watched Carry-On, a Netflix movie seemingly going for low-budget Die Hard. It was perfect — wheeee! — in the way that only an action movie that doesn't take itself seriously but also doesn't goof off can be. The Beekeeper (rent, purchase and on MGM+) is similarly such a movie. It stars Jason Statham saying "I protect the hive" a bazillion times as he punches dudes who stole money from the nice Phylicia Rashad, who was letting him live on her farm (keeping bees, it's a whole theme with him). Did you have a tough week? Pour yourself a tall glass of The Beekeeper.

• Also fun: "Sexy tennis" was not a thing I ever thought or thought I needed in my life but then I saw Challengers (rent, purchase, Prime Video and MGM+), which is soapy silly fun with the trio of Zendava, Mike Faist and Josh O'Connor.

• The M3gan Award for funniest horror: Abigail (rent, purchase and Prime Video) features a bunch of random criminals brought together in a creepy old house to do the simple job of kidnapping one little girl and keeping her alive and unharmed until her father pays the ransom. The trailer gives away both what will make this a challenge and a hoot.

• This horror movie has no stakes! (complimentary): I did not have high hopes for A Quiet Place: Day One (rent, purchase, Paramount+ and MGM+); the trailer doesn't give you much and it's not really a story plugged into the main Quiet Place universe. But as we get to know Lupita Nyong'o's character the movie becomes a whole unexpected thing, with a whole different approach to what counts as stakes and what the big bad truly is. It's great! Very much not what you expect from a prequel/

• Thunderbolts* (May 2) I can't help it • Love Hurts (Feb. 7) Ke Huy Quan - Marvel's kickoff to summer featuring Black Widow characters looks like it has the potential to be scruffy fun.

• 28 Years Later (June 20) That trailer, featuring Rudyard Kipling's poem "Boots," • Mickey 17 (April 18) Bong Joon Ho's is creepy-great. I am officially excited for sidequel.

· Horror movies doing a thing: These streamers might not work as big-budget, bigscreen outings but I feel like the scale of TV allows them to focus on one element of their horror-ness and really amp it up. Woman of the Hour (streaming on Netflix), directed by and starring Anna Kendrick, is scary not for anything specific that happens in the movie but for the way it perfectly captures the "how do I keep this man at a bar/job interview/dark parking lot/apartment common area from killing me" anxiety of women in so many circumstances. Hold Your Breath (Hulu/Disney+) is set during the Dust Bowl but it has real pandemic-era vibes with how danger is in the air and how that plays with the mind of a woman who has already lost one child and is trying to protect the other three. Don't Move (Netflix) is a suspenseful movie about survival. House of Spoils (Prime Video) has Ariana DeBose maybe going mad from the haunted house where she is trying to start up a trendoid fine dining restaurant or maybe the toxic chef culture or maybe it's the strange greens from the garden possibly planted by a witch? Either way, it's a fun time of a horror movie that kind of morphs into something else.

• Character-forward: Lily Gladstone in Fancy Dance (Apple TV+), Joan Chen and Izaac Wang in Didi (rent, purchase and Peacock), Danielle Deadwyler and John David Washington in The Piano Lesson (Netflix), and everybody in Rez Ball (Netflix) and Thelma (rent, purchase and Hulu/Disney+) turn in great performances in solid movies that all blend comedy and drama, family relationships and people trying to figure out who they are now.

• Honorable character mentions: Wobbly movies can still have barnburning performances. Check out Jodie Comer going big with the hair and the accent work in The Bikeriders (Prime Video, rent or purchase). Kerry Washington (and the real life story) wins you over despite some shakiness in The Six Triple Eight (Netflix). Chris Hemsworth feels like the only person really having fun with the sandy craziness of Furiosa: A Mad Max Saga (Max, rent or purchase). But the "making his own fun, baby!" prize for this year truly goes to Denzel Washington in Gladiator II (in theaters).

• Animation! The Wild Robot (for purchase) is full of animal hijinks and it's a tear-jerking look at parenthood - plus so lovely! Transformers One (rent, purchase and Paramount+) is a neat prequel of the Transformers universe we know and also a clever story about the ways people (er, trans-

forming robots) respond to injustice. Big City Greens The Movie: Spacecation (for purchase and on Disney+) is a sweet story about family and it's a musical and it's in space and it has an early The Simpsons level of high joke density. Inside Out 2 (Disney+ and rent) mostly avoids the lessening effects of a sequel and turns in a really interesting look at what happens when anxiety (and Anxiety, as voiced by Maya Hawke) takes the wheel.

• The Once Upon a 1980s Time at the Movies Nostalgia Award: Kevin Smith gives us his The Fabelmans with The 4:30 Movie (rent or purchase), a very cute riff on the filmmaker as a young goofus.

• The usual caveats: There are, as always, like a whole slew of late season movies I haven't seen yet - in theaters now Flow and Mustafa: The Lion King; Christmas Day releases Nosferatu, A Complete Unknown, Babygirl and The Fire Inside; Wallace & Gromit: Vengeance Most Fowl (Netflix on Jan. 3); thus-far only limited release films like Nickel Boys, Nightbitch, The Return, The Brutalist, September 5 and now-harder to find movies like A Real Pain (Forbes.com reported it should be on VOD on Dec. 31). There are several awards attention-garnering movies that we can all catch up on now — Anora (rent or purchase), Emilia Pérez (Netflix), Memoir of a Snail (rent or purchase), Heretic (rent or purchase), We Live in Time (rent or purchase), Maria (Netflix), and Here (rent or purchase).

· Real world: Martha Stewart would be a fun person to three-martini-lunch with, is my takeaway from Martha (Netflix), her documentary where she offers crisp observations about everything from her romances to her legal woes. In Will & Harper (Netflix) longtime friends and comedy co-conspirators Will Ferrell and Harper Steele road trip across America in this documentary about friendship, the never-ending journey of figuring yourself out and Harper's desire to travel to the middle America places she's always loved and see if, as she says, they will love her back now that she's out as trans. The song about friendship Kristen Wiig sings at the end might actually be one of the sweetest things in movies this year. In *Piece by Piece* (purchase), Pharrell Williams not only tells his life story but also is able to illustrate his relationship with music via the use of Lego animation.

• Just some really great movies: In Janet Planet (Max, rent and purchase) Julianne Nicholson and Zoe Ziegler are an unconventional but loving mother-daughter pair. 

NITE **Looking back and forward** Recalling 2024, and looking ahead to next year

New Hampshire's music and comedy scene had a robust year. From start to finish, here are some of the highlights, along with some sad notes, followed by a peek at the year ahead.

In January, blues singer Bobby Rush came to Concord's BNH Stage for a concert. At 91 years old, Rush is a one-man rebuttal to ageism. He got his start as a thigh- and chest-slapping hambone performer, and the first record he released was a 78 RPM shellac disc.

The vibe continued in February at Manchester's Rex Theatre, as the annual Winter Blues Festival featured local harmonica player and singer Nick David's band celebrating a new album with support from some of his Texas label's other acts. Over in Portsmouth, embattled comic Kathy Griffin played the Music Hall in Portsmouth.

Blending elements of alt-country and harmony-rich classic rock. Slim Volume brought a breath of fresh air to the local music scene, releasing a trio of EPs and playing listening room shows like one in early March at The Livery in Sunapee. On St. Patrick's Day the rousing Rebel Collective inclusively played Celtic rock in an Italian restaurant.

Four days later, Mike Koutrobis filmed a special at Nashua's Center for the Arts, a high point for the hometown comic.

The laughs continued in April as Daniel Sloss brought his edgy act to Laconia's Colonial Theatre. Few can challenge an audience like the British comedian.

Carole King's Beautiful ran through most of May at Manchester's Palace Theatre, continuing a year-long theme, musicals centered on pop and the classic rock era. The Palace also had the ABBA/Disco revue Dancing Queens in January and the gritty Jersey Boys (also done by two other theater companies) in November.

Bike Week roared back to the Lakes Region, along with music, as karate-kicking blues rocker James Montgomery's band played during the June event. The summer shed season got in gear at Bank of NH Pavilion, highlighted by Hootie & the Blowfish and Collective Soul bringing a '90s vibe.

Badfish played its traditional Fourth of July concert at Casino Ballroom in Hampton Beach. In the wake of a Sublime reunion at Coachella, they're mixing more original songs into the tribute act. Nantucket comic Brian Glowacki brought standup to Beans & Greens in Gilford for the first time.

Yoga, sustainability and music returned to Hillsborough in August as the Barefoot Festival's second iteration happened. Jimmy Dunn's Hampton Beach Comedy Festival is in its second decade; Dunn hung with his comedian pals and also celebrated his second season with the Frasier reboot.

Triptych, a collaboration between guitarist Stephane Wrembel and pianist Jean-Michel Pilc, brought instrumental mastery to UNH in September, while percussive guitarist Senie Hunt played acoustic and electric tunes on a short tour and then headed back to Nashville.

In October, Everclear sold out the Music Hall with fellow '90s stars Marcy Playground and Jimmy's Chicken Shack, and Todd Rundgren explained why he's indifferent to his induction into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame prior to a Nashua show. Hell Beach made one of the year's best albums, Beachworld, and played it during a raucous Shaskeen show.

November began with Beatles disciple Moon Walker at BNH Stage and continued with Willie Nile rocking the Rex while showing that he's every musician's favorite musician for a reason. A year to the day after he headlined Nashua Center for the Arts for the first time, Drew Dunn was back. Later, the Nashua native hit the road with Dane Cook — again, again.

"I have learned a lot watching and working with Dane over the past few years," Dunn wrote on Facebook. "I am feeling more inspired and motivated than ever in this comedy pursuit. We always have a great time on tour, and I am lucky to call a guy I grew up listening to my friend."

December began with a reminder of New Hampshire's wealth of talent, as the winners of a talent contest sponsored by New Hampshire Music Collective performed a showcase at BNH Stage. The venue was

good to NHMC all year long, with a few sold-out shows and regular crowds for its monthly series in the venue's lounge.

Overall highlights in 2024 included the opening of Pembroke City Limits, a listening room, bar and restaurant launched by music maven Rob Azevedo. Six months in, it's doing great. "We have been blown away by the response," Azevedo said in December, "Not only to the incredible talented musicians, but our dedicated audiences have exceeded our expectations."

Another new venue on the scene is Milk Street Studio in Dover, launched by musician and entrepreneur Kurt Eddins, with help from reggae guitarist/songwriter Sebastian Franks and custom guitar builder John Ayer. Shows began there during the summer and several are scheduled in the New Year.

Finally, the regional music community was stunned by the death of Brooks Young at age 42. The blues rock guitarist was in the middle of a string of successes, including tours with George Thorogood, Sammy Hagar and other rock greats, when his car was hit head-on in Alton on the morning of Nov. 8.

In other sad music news, beloved singer/songwriter Dave Mallett passed away on Dec. 17; he was 73. The Maine native performed regularly in New Hampshire. His "Garden Song (Inch By Inch)" was covered by Peter, Paul & Mary and Pete Seeger. Marty Stuart, Kathy Mattea, Alison Krauss, Emmylou Harris, and Hal Ketchum also recorded his songs. 🦚

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NITE Bourbon Street bubbly N'awlins New Year in Concord

Mix the effervescent nightclub at the heart of *Moulin Rouge* with Dixieland style and light it up in a disco inferno for a sense of what will be happening at BNH Stage on the final night of 2024. *The Big Easy New Year's Eve* reprises elements that elevated two previous First Night events presented by Boston's Shuttavac Productions, while adding a few new ones.

The prevailing theme is dress to impress, Shuttavac's Beth McGurr explained recently. "New Year's is that day where it's easier to get people to participate; they want to come out," she said. "You can come in a tuxedo, a ball gown or in fishnets, and you'll feel comfortable, fun and vibrant."

As in previous years, there will be aerialists spinning from above, dancers on the main stage, and Boston DJ BegBick with a mix ranging from '70s disco hits to Chappell Roan, Dua Lipa, Lizzo and other modern acts, along with hip-hop and house. Also, as a projection screen provides visual effects behind the stage, "interactive cabaret acts" will perform.

"It's like the French Quarter; Moulin

Rouge meets Bourbon Street," McGurr said, noting that drag performers and dancers will do songs from the Broadway musical that began as a Baz Luhrmann jukebox movie. "The host has that charismatic thing going, with the suit and the little mustache."

Upstairs, the BNH Stage's Cantab Lounge will morph into a speakeasy, with entertainment provided by Catnip Junkies, a Providence, R.I., band that regularly does a show called the Bourbon Street Jubilee and bills itself as "the happiest, tappiest and brassiest band you'll ever hear."

Their performance is filled with comedic antics, along with tap dancing, tuba solos, group robot dancing, occasional roller skating and kazoo solos, injecting a New Orleans second line spirit into the First Night celebration. "They have a lot of fun with the horns and everything," McGurr said.

This will be the third New Year's event she's done in downtown Concord. The first was the lead-in to 2020, a year she had a number of other events booked that had to be scrapped due to the pandemic. Shuttavac returned to BNH Stage in 2022 to do a *Great Gatsby*-themed NYE party,

and McGurr is happy to be back for 2024.

"When they called me for this year, I was like, yes, 100 percent, sign me up," she said. "I love the venue. And you can change the whole room by changing the projection screen, which I love."
