Mosquito tips

The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services sent out a press release reminding people that we are in the thick of mosquito season.

In New Hampshire, three viruses circulate among mosquitoes: Jamestown Canyon virus, Eastern Equine Encephalitis virus and West Nile virus. So far this summer, one mosquito batch each from Londonderry and Keene have tested positive for Jamestown Canyon virus and one mosquito batch each from Manchester and Nashua have tested positive for West Nile virus. the release said. This year so far, there have been two adults from Belknap County hosptialized with Jamestown Canvon virus but no human infections of West Nile or Eastern Equine Encephalitis viruses, the release said.

"Mosquito-transmitted diseases can have long-term impacts on people's health," said State Epidemiologist Dr. Benjamin Chan in the release from the Department's Divison of Public Health Services. "The risk for diseases like West Nile virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis will only increase as the summer progresses and we move into the fall, so everyone should take steps to prevent mosquito bites."

All three viruses have flu-like symptoms, such as fever, muscle aches, headaches and fatigue, the release said. In rare cases, the diseases can infect the nervous system including the brain and spinal cord, the release said.

To prevent bites, the release recommends:

· Wearing protective cloth-

long-sleeved shirts, and insect repellents.

· Taking precautions in mosquito habitats including forests, marshes and tall grasses.

• Eliminating standing water. · Making sure doors and win-

dows have tight-fitting screens. Call the division with mos-

New historic places

The New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources has announced in a press release that the State Historical Resources Council has added seven properties to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places. These include:

· First Baptist Church of Manchester, built in 1872 in the Italianate style, which played a role in the creation of several other Baptist churches in the city and offered spaces for non-Baptist congregations to meet and grow, according to the release.

· The First Unitarian Congregational Church, dedicated January 10, 1861, and the third Congregational meetinghouse in Wilton, the first to be built solely as a Congregational Church rather than as a meetinghouse for both church and town use. It combines elements of both Greek Revival and Gothic Revival architectural styles with a small addition added in 1924, according to the release.

• The James A. Bryant Memo-

ing including long pants and rial Library, built in Northwood in 1941 and named for its benefactor, a Union Army veteran. It was the town's first permanent and free-standing library, although its library operations ended in 1989 and the building now houses the local historical society's collections, according to the release.

• The Josiah and Sarah Brown Farm in Stratham, with a main house built in the Federal style in 1816 and what appears to be a seventeenth century two-story ell that may be one of the oldest existing buildings in town.

· Peterborough's Kyes-Sage House, which was built in 1845 and is an example of Carpenter Gothic architecture, a variant of the Gothic Revival style of architecture that was popular in homes between the 1840s and the 1870s.


• The Acworth Village Store, a relatively unaltered example of a mid-nineteenth century commercial building built in 1865.

• The Aldworth Stone Gateway, erected in 1906-1907, a physical reminder of Harrisville's history of summer estates built in the early 20th century and was the entryway to wealthy industrialists Arthur and Alice Childs' home through much of the 1930s.

2024 is "The Year of the Plum" according to the New Hampshire Fruit Growers Association. Last year a cold snap wiped out almost the entire crop across New Hampshire, but in a July 29 press release the Association announced that "plums are making a major comeback this year." The press release went on to say that while plums are typically harvested in August, many growers have already begun harvesting. 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News & NOTES Q&A **Tax help** Now we baits from the

New website from the NH Dept. of Revenue Administration

Ora LeMere, Assistant Commissioner of the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration (NHDRA), spoke about the Department's new website, unveiled this summer, that is designed to be easier to use, will be more responsive to Granite State taxpayers, and will optimize access to its Granite Tax Connect portal, which enables taxpayers, tax professionals and other NHDRA customers to manage their accounts, according to a press release. Visit revenue.nh.gov.

Can you give a brief overview of what the NHDRA is and does?

The Department of Revenue Administration is the taxing agency for our great state of New Hampshire and we are responsible for administering the tax laws that drive the revenue.... Generally speaking, we have divisions that make up the DRA. We have the admin unit, that

would be myself, the assistant commissioner, and the commissioner, Lindsey Stepp, at the head of that. We have an Audit Division, a Collections Division, Municipal Property Division and lastly a Taxpayer Services Division, each having different functions to make sure that we fairly and efficiently administer those tax laws to our constituents.

With no sales tax or income tax in the state, what taxes do people in New Hampshire need to pay?

The most focused, if you will, are business taxes, which include the Business Enterprise Tax as well as Business Profits Tax. We have the Meals and Rooms Tax, we have the property taxes and we have the Interest and Dividends Tax, which I'm sure you've heard is phasing out. I think those are the majority of our taxes. We do have transparency on our website that gives information into each of our individual taxes, that also includes Tobacco, Communication Services, some smaller taxes....

What do these taxes fund in New Hampshire?

The taxes generally bring in around \$2.9 billion in revenue each year and that is divided up and it is appropriated to different agencies to fund many different things. Funding can include the Department of Safety. Road Toll [Bureau] has a tax that they also administer. There are a few other taxes that we don't administer but it all, for the most part, goes into funds ... so we can fund the main functions of our state.... We fund 80 percent of the General Fund.

The taxpayer assistance site has information about what forms to use, the laws and rules, tax fraud, it's probably one of the most utilized pages on our site. We also made sure that our smaller businesses, mostly restaurants and hotels or short-term rental types of taxpayers, had their own page as our Meals and Rooms Operators. This page has a plethora of information and has links that help an operator know what they need to do, how to get to our portal to file or to apply for a license. ... we try to make it customer-centric, taxpayer centric, and give them areas in which to visit where they wouldn't need to click all around the site to find certain information that was pertinent.

Why is it important to have a tax website focused toward the needs of taxpayers?

I mean, plainly stated, taxes can be confusing. It's really important that not only we administer those tax laws fairly and efficiently but we do so in a friendly and supportive manner.... the support that we try to provide for our constituents is ready and available at all times.

New Hampshire girls and mental health

In an Aug. 2 article, Nashua InkLink, nashua.inklink.news, reported that according to a recent study by the New Hampshire Women's Foundation, "50% of girls in the state suffer from mental health issues, including anxiety, depression, self-harm and suicidal thoughts. This rate is the highest in New England and surpasses the national average of 41%." The article went on to quote data from New Hampshire's Department of Health and Human Services revealing that girls in the state attempted suicide twice as often as boys between 2011 and 2023. The reasons for the challenges for New Hampshire's girls remains unclear.

Problematic liverwurst

Deli meat supplier Boar's Head (boarshead.com) initiated a recall of its Strassburger Brand Liverwurst on July 25, after learning that it might be contaminated with *Listeria monocytogenes*, a bacteria that causes the food poisoning listeria. The company subsequently expanded the recall to include "71 products produced between May 10, 2024, and July 29, 2024, under the Boar's Head and Old Country brand names," according to a July 30 USDA announcement.

Jimmy Dunn is having a great year. He plays Moose on the Paramount+ reboot of Frasier, and as a phone interview begins he's standing outside a Hollywood soundstage, having just wrapped the second season. His last sitcom, The McCarthys, was canceled with four unaired episodes, so he's in great spirits.

Dunn is mum about storvlines, but he will say that fans of the show, which stars Kelsey Grammer, can expect a few head-spinning guest appearances when it returns Sept. 19. Additionally, there is one episode of the show that lingers in his mind as extra special.

"For a kid who started telling jokes in the back of Chinese restaurants, I couldn't believe what I was doing," he said. "What I did with Kelsey last week was just an absolute pinch-me moment, like this isn't happening — is it really? It was so damn cool. There's a lot to look forward to."

His lucky streak on the West Coast continued with deciding to fly JetBlue before every other airline became immobilized by a massive computer bug. So Dunn will be home soon, and ready to kick off another Hampton Beach Comedy Festival.

The event began as an excuse for Dunn to invite a bunch of his comedian pals to his home in Hampton Beach for a few days of barbecuing steaks in his backyard, playing cards and surfing, after telling jokes at Ashworth-by-the-Sea, a hotel where he parked cars as a teen. It's now held at McGuirk's Ocean View Hotel.

Fifteen years on, the event has grown to six nights, with the camaraderie, along with

Rattigan's also hilarious; he's even taught stand-up. He'll also perform every night.

"He'll do a little short set, but it'll be different jokes," Dunn said. "I'll be doing different stuff every night. Every show is different."

Back in the early 2000s, Dunn took part in the Nantucket Comedy Festival.

"My buddy Kevin used to have the keys to a hotel down there," he said. "We stayed there for five days with 20 other comedians, and it was summer camp. It was absolute

Playing at a hot machine Kathleen Madigan hits big

While Jimmy Dunn is stoked that his comedy festival is now a record six nights, he knows there's a difference between what he's doing and what happens at the nearby Casino Ballroom.

"The big, big names — Kathleen Madigan, David Spade — they're going to sell out the Casino," he said. "This is a little hundred and fifty seat outdoor venue; it's more for the locals. And we have a great time with it."

Comedy at the Casino this year has included two sold-out Pete Davidson shows, along with TikTok favorite Nurse Blake. Upcoming is Madigan, with her pal Lewis Black appearing in September. The Missouri comedian is riding a wave of late. Her *Hunting Bigfoot* special is a hit, skewering aging politicians kindly but gently and empathizing with millennials in service jobs.

Also, after years of resistance, she launched a podcast.

"There were way too many comics, that's why I never did it," she explained by phone from a tour stop in Nashville. "I'd go to Improv City in L.A. there's 20 people at the bar going, 'You want to do my podcast?' No, I don't! We're all talking about the same thing. It's just comedians interviewing comedians ... let's raise the bar here."

She's the only comic on *Madigan's Pubcast*, with her assistant acting as a foil. On each show, she drinks a local craft beer and has a few snacks, then takes on current events, in between virtually stalking her hero, Queen Stevie Nicks. It's fun, loose and full of Madigan's trademark "Are you kidding me?" snarkiness.

She also digs into favorite topics, like the differences between today's youth and her generation. During the interview, she talked about twentysomething Zoomers who'll

leave a job before even starting it. "I look at my parents, they took jobs that they were supposed to," she said. "They seem to know themselves better than we did, and I think that'll be good in the long run."

It continues a brilliant bit from her last special that placed the weight of the world on Taco Bell workers who could quit at a moment's notice. "Do you know how to make a chalupa, because I don't," she said, urging boomers not to trigger them with angry demands for out-of-stock mild sauce.

Her Aug. 24 appearance at Hampton Beach will be set up cabaret style, with a general admission section in front of the stage and some high top tables behind, with the majority standard seating, a format that was first tried last year.

"When I looked at the seat maps online, I thought, 'This is going to be funky,'" she said, "but it works for comedy."

Madigan is currently on the Potluck Party 2024 Tour. "If you've seen the Amazon special, there'll be some of that, some new stuff and then some greatest hits," she said. "It's basically a big old potluck of whatever fits the night. Last week I was doing jokes about Biden being old, and we've kind of moved on from those. I mean, I guess they still work, he's still the president, but I try not to write topical stuff, ever ... it's nearly impossible, unless you have a staff of writ-

She's grateful for comedy's resurgence post-pandemic, with things like Bill Burr — "the funniest person right now to me, like the person I'd pay for" — selling out Fenway Park and others doing similarly outsized business.

"If you think about the '80s and '90s, there were maybe five comics that could do an arena and sell it out, and now there's probably over 10," she said. "It's like we've become the rock stars in this weird turn of events 35 years into this. I'm like, 'Oh, now we're mainstream?' We used to be a niche thing ... like jazz."

Now in her 50s, Madigan has no plans to slow down. "I kind of feel like the slot machine is finally paying off, you put all your money in ... and then it starts hitting. I'm not leaving now; I'll leave when the machine goes cold. So far, the machine's super-hot, so I'm staying."

The Manchester International Film Festival celebrates local filmmakers and the wider world

The 2024 Manchester International Film Festival takes place on Friday. Aug. 9, and Saturday, Aug. 10, at the Rex Theatre. Warren O'Reilly, the Festival Director since the beginning in 2022, is pumped for the third year of the event.

The Sunflower Bloom Festival runs from Saturday, Aug. 10, to Sunday, Aug. 18, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends and to 7 p.m. on weekdays at Sunfox Farm in Concord.

"This is our second year in Concord but our sixth time doing the festival," said Amber Pollock, owner of Sunfox Farm, who runs the farm with CEO and manager Greg Pollock. "It's a whole-day outdoor visit-the-farm kind of experience."

How does one get there? "We have free parking at NHTI and we have a free shuttle bus to the field. For handicap parking, it would be at 6 Loudon Road," Pollock said.

Everyone is invited.

"It's a family fun atmosphere. Everybody gets to come out. We have live music every day, food trucks, an artisan craft fair, 20 acres of sunflowers and plenty of opportunities to take all your pictures." - +

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There are ample prime photo and selfie spots. "We got an old truck to sit on, we've got an old tractor, there are paths through the field with some viewing decks."

Time is of the essence.

"The flowers bloom for about 10 days so we got that short window. We try to make the most of it."

How can participants make the most of the festival?

"Each weekend we have probably about 20 different craft vendors or artisan vendors. We've got music all day on the weekends. Food trucks all day."

For a more low-key experience, some time during the week is best.

"It's smaller-scale during the week and definitely more active on the weekends."

Any day is a good day to walk amongst the sunflowers.

"One new thing that we have this year is this elevated bridge along the path in the flowers, so that's something new that we're excited for people to be able to experience and kind of gets them up over the flowers, which is pretty cool."

This is a field of sunflowers, not a library, so there will be music.

"We have a really full music lineup this year. We work with the New Hampshire Music Collective and they've been amazing making sure that there's live music all day. which is exciting."

Amber's most treasured experience at the festival are the flowers themselves.

"The flowers blooming every year is probably our favorite thing to see."

So how does the seed turn into the sunflower?

"From the time that we put it in the ground it takes somewhere between 60 and 70 days until it flowers. Then, mid-October, another 30 to 40 days after that is when we would harvest them so that's when they're ready to take the seeds out of."

Sunfox farm produces sunflower seed oil.

"We grow one type. We grow a blackseed high-oleic sunflower and we grow it to produce sunflower oil. We go through the whole process ourselves. We do all the growing, the harvesting, the processing and the bottling."

These types of seeds contain properties that make them healthier for consumption.

"That's kind of the point of the farm is to create food, and we have this cool byproduct where we can have people in the community come out and see it."

"We press all of the seeds for oil. The seeds that we grow aren't what you would eat or what you would see at a baseball game. Those are a different type of seed. The ones that we grow are specific for oil." But the flowers look the same.

What drew Amber to sunflowers?

"Yellow is my favorite color, so there's

These beautiful plants get quite tall.

"Once they're blooming they'll be somewhere between 6 and 8 feet tall. So they're not like the mammoth, giant sunflowers that get to be 14 feet or anything like that, but they do tower over you. You can kind of get lost in them."

Make it a day or even a week at the Sunflower Festival at Sunfox Farm.

"During the summer we think it's really great to be able to find things outside. Our prices are pretty low so it's a good activity for the entire family. There's stuff you can do all day here and it's 20 acres of flowers, so it's something that a lot of people in New Hampshire haven't seen before."

INSIDE/OUTSIDE 125 years of town festivities Londonderry celebrates Old Home Day with four days of events

The 125th Annual Town of Londonderry Old Home Day starts on Wednesday, Aug. 14, and goes until Saturday, Aug. 17.

"Old Home Day started in New Hampshire in 1899 by Gov. Frank Rollins. It was designed to bring New Hampshire's, as he puts it, 'sons and daughters back to the state,' who had moved elsewhere. It was an effort to revitalize tourism and celebrate the smaller communities in New Hampshire amidst what was a population decline," said Kirsten Hildonen, Administrative Support Coordinator for Londonderry, who is leading the event along with colleague Doug Cole.

"Forty-four different towns celebrated Old Home Day that first year in 1899 and Londonderry was one of them and we've been doing it every year," Hildonen said.

"It's gone back and forth, historically, between Old Home Day and Old Home Week. What we've really landed on is a fourday celebration in Londonderry."

After 125 years, what's new?

"One of the unique things about our Old Home Day celebration is that it's not the same every day. Each day is a different event, different celebration. So it's not four days of the same thing, it's four very different days with very different activities," Hildonen said. Each day is an experience.

"One of the big events on Wednesday that's always a big hit is our Senior Bingo and BBQ ... the seniors are served by the police officers, our town leaders call bingo and it's free. We usually give out 220 tickets," she said.

Music is always a great time in Londonderry.

"That evening on Wednesday is one of our most popular Concerts on the Common. It's the Studio Two Beatles tribute band. It starts at 7 p.m. and last year we had almost 1,000 people attend," she said. More music occurs on Thursday. That concert "is run by our Londonderry School District Music Director ... and that starts at 7. [It's a] bunch of

> "We started a color run for families. kids, people of all ages. That's going to be held at 5:30 p.m., at the LAFA Field. There is pre-registration up on our rec program website for that event," she said. The cost is \$15 per person but caps at \$45 per family. "Everybody throws color at everybody. Everybody is encouraged to wear a white T-shirt."

> "The biggest event, Friday - this is the one I think people outside of Londonderry will have a ton of interest in - is our food truck festival and fireworks on Friday night. We get about 25 food trucks together. We open it up at 6 p.m. and people can stake out their place for fireworks that night. We have such an awesome variety this year, really excited about the different trucks we have There's something for literally every taste," Hildonen said. The food trucks close down at 9 p.m. Around 15 minutes later, or when it gets dark, is a long bout of fireworks.

Is a 'no heat' problem a real problem?



I have a "no heat" problem on my Pontiac Grand Prix SE 3.9 liter. It runs fine with no overheating (vet). I suspect a

mer. Will bypassing the heater core cause drivability issues? — Ronald

No. Driving a '99 Pontiac is what will cause your drivability issues, Ronald. I'm not sure why you want to bypass the heater core in the summer if it's not putting out any heat. But if you do, bypassing it will have no effect on the cooling system - positive or negative. The heater core is, essentially, a second, small radiator that's under the dashboard in the passenger compartment. It's attached to your car's cooling system via two hoses - one that sends coolant in, and one that sends it back. And when you turn on the heat, that's where the heat comes from.

Bypassing it is a piece of cake: You sim-

ply pull off the two hoses that connect it to the cooling system. Then shunt them together with a connector, clamp it up tight, and you're done. But if you live in a place where you need heat in the winter, you'll eventually want to fix it, Ronald.

I'd suggest you start by flushing it. It may have built up so much corrosion over the last 25 years that the small passages are blocked,

FOOD Perfecting gluten-free bread Dishon Bakery crafts artisanal bread loaves without the wheat

Evan Lang described his perfect, platonic ideal of a loaf of bread.

Made of flour, water, yeast and salt, it "would have a thick crust to give it a little bit of character," he said, "baked pretty dark — caramelized in a way that you get flavor also from the crust. "The crumb should be relatively open. It should not fall apart; it should stay together, and it should not be gummy, meaning if you take the knife and you cut into it, we don't want anything stuck on the blade."

One of Lang's missions in life is to make that bread, but without any gluten. At Dishon Bakery in Manchester, he is doing it.

Gluten is a stretchy protein found in wheat and a few other grains that helps give conventional bread its texture. As yeast ferments various nutrients in wheat flour, it gives off carbon dioxide gas, which is trapped by the stretchy gluten fibers in bread dough, allowing the dough to puff up — what bakers call "rise." Unfortunately, some people — those with celiac disease, for instance — can't digest gluten, and others choose not to eat it for nutritional reasons, so for bakers like Lang the trick is to find a way of duplicating gluten's stretchiness without the actual gluten.

"If you go to the supermarket and you check out the gluten-free bread there, it's not great," Lang said. "It's either small or crumbly. And if you're looking at the ingredients, it's more like cake; it's full of sugar, it's full of starches. We're creating a product that's a little more artisanal — kind of like real bread." The secret, he said, is a slow, cold fermentation, and high

hydration — meaning that his dough has more water in it than conventional wheat breads.

"Traditionally, bread and pizza have different hydration percentages," he explained, "from 60 percent up to 100 percent for really, really Neapolitan-style pizza. "Our breads are all over 100 percent hydration." This means that Dishon's bread dough has more water than flour in it. By fermenting it slowly, at a low temperature, Lang gives it time to completely incorporate all that water.

Lang's dough starts with brown rice, sorghum and millet flours — all gluten-free grains — and potato and tapioca starch, then builds the dough up to the point where it can be treated much like wheat dough.

"We bake on a stone like regular bread," he said. "Traditionally gluten-free bread is kind of like a batter. It's baked in a tin and ours are baked free-form on the stone."

Dishon Bakery started as a cottage business in New Jersey in 2022.

"We were selling in farmers markets, and we very quickly outgrew that," Lang remembered. "We moved to Philadelphia and we were baking in a commercial kitchen there and doing a lot of wholesale, continuing with farmers markets and shipping online. We were doing a pretty

good online business. People would order online, we'd package it up and ship it out. We moved up here and we re-evaluated what we were doing." The Langs decided to focus more on face-to-face interactions with their customers. "Since we did have enough demand for the product, it made no sense for us to sell more [wholesale]. So we're going to try here to exclusively do retail, direct to consumer."

Many gluten-free bakeries produce mostly sweet products — cookies, cakes, pastries and so on — but Dishon focuses almost exclusively on bread products. Lang keeps a freezer case with other gluten-free products for customers who are looking for something less bready.

"We have sweets that are New Hampshire-based," Lang said. "We want to give them an outlet here. None of them are based in Manchester. So this brings their product to Manchester and also allows us to fill the case with products that we don't do and we don't specialize in."

JOHN FLADD COOKS Rhubarb Bars

Cookie base and topping

cup (2 sticks) butter
cup (200 g) brown sugar
egg
teaspoons vanilla
3¼ cups (405 g) all-purpose flour

³/₄ cups (405 g) an-purpose nous ³/₄ teaspoon baking powder

Rhubarb filling

2½ cups (285 g) chopped frozen rhubarb 1 cup (200 g) granulated sugar 1 Tablespoon cornstarch juice of half a lemon

Glaze

juice of the other half lemon ³/₄ cup (85 g) powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line an 8x8" baking pan.

Cream the butter and sugar together, and beat until it is fluffy, about 3 minutes. Beat in the egg and vanilla. Not that this will mean anything to you, but the mixture should be the same color as my Oma's bathroom tiles.

In a separate bowl, mix the flour and baking powder together, then spoon the dry mixture into the batter. Put about half the mixture into the prepared baking dish and press it with the back of a spatula or a measuring cup to push it into all four corners. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes, until the edges just start to turn brown. Remove from the oven and set aside. Chill the other half of the dough in your refrigerator. Don't let it make you feel guilty by giving you a wounded look; its time will come.

In a small saucepan, combine the frozen rhubarb, sugar, cornstarch and lemon juice, and cook over medium-low heat. As the rhubarb thaws, it will release a fair amount of liquid. Stir frequently. Bring to a low boil, and cook for 6 to 8 minutes, until it passes the Spoon Test. This is something you read about all the time in old cookbooks. Coat the back of a spoon with the rhubarb syrup, then run a finger through it. If it leaves a clear line, your mixture has turned to jam. Set the jam aside to cool.

At this point, you have the baked dough, the raw dough and the rhubarb jam all taking time-outs in separate corners. Do not feel sorry for them. They know what they did.

After the jam has cooled slightly, tell it that it has finished with time out and can play with its friends. Spoon it over the baked cookie base, and spread it to cover. Remove the rest of the cookie dough from the refrigerator, and drop thumbsized chunks of it over the top of the jam. It should pretty much cover it, with hints of jam peeking out here and there.

Return the baking dish to the oven, and bake for another 45-50 minutes. Pat it lightly on top with your hand to see if it has finished baking. Take it out of the oven and set it aside to cool.

Mix the powdered sugar and the juice from the other half of your lemon together to make a pourable glaze. Spoon it over the top of the rhubarb-cookie mixture.

When everything has cooled, remove the cookie mixture from the baking dish and cut into bars. How many bars is up to you. I got 12, but if you look down and see one gigantic bar, that's between you and your pancreas.

Because of all the brown sugar, these bars have a nutty brown color and look suspiciously like they might be made with whole wheat. Rest assured, these do not *taste* healthy. The butter and brown sugar give a warm, butterscotch flavor that is balanced out by the tartness of the rhubarb and the zinginess of the lemon. They taste like a blondie with benefits.

Blue Öyster Cult, Secret Treaties (Columbia Records)



Last week I riffed on Sweet's *Give Us A Wink* album as a public service to Zoomers and millennials who're interested in expanding their knowledge of old-school, pre-ringtone-oriented rock; this time it's Blue Öyster Cult's third (1974) effort, the BÖC album I'd recommend if you were going offgrid. As a friend noted, BÖC was/is a bunch of New York slackers who could barely believe their luck in getting a big record contract in the '70s; they uniquely straddled a line between serious hard rock outfit and joke band, which sort of continued here, with their usual acid-trip lyrical forays ("Harvester Of

Eyes") and such and so. But beneath their Dadaist conceptual approach there was some serious beauty ("Astronomy" is a perfect song for any decent baritone to try wrapping their voice around), some badass hard rock ("Dominance and Submission") and a chaotic take on life with the German Luftwaffe circa end-stage WWII ("ME-262"). This LP was pivotal in setting the stage for 1976's *Agents of Fortune*, which of course yielded their biggest hit, "Don't Fear The Reaper." By the way, the origins of the antique music-box recording of "Waves of the Danube" used in the intro to "Flaming Telepaths" remain unknown to this day, a tidbit I find seriously cool. A great snapshot of a band that was happily/painfully exiting adolescence. A+—*Eric W. Saeger*

StrateJacket, Bad Start (Edgeout Records)



Like so many others, the proper release of this album was in purgatory for a couple of years while America waited for Covid to become accepted as the endemic danger it is today, but all systems do appear to be go for an Oct. 11 street date, so here goes. • Yee-hah, if there's anything that happens almost as frequently as a new album release from King Gizzard & the Lizard Wizard, it's San Francisco garage rockers Orinoka Crash Suite (now known as **Osees**, formerly The Ohsees and whatnot) changing their band name again "in order to annoy the press!" Personally I'm not annoyed by it; it just makes me ignore them, so let me go listen to "Cassius, Brutus & Judas Single," a song from the band's new album, *I SORCS 80*. Wow, it's buzzy, cool no-wave, too bad I'll forget I ever liked it and simply resort to riffing on their stupid band name gimmick again next time.

• Lastly it's lo-fi jazz-funk bro Louis Cole's new LP, *Nothing*, which includes the song "These Dreams are Killing Me," a great little tune that sounds like Justice trying to be a normal soundsystem. It has my approval. —*Eric W. Saeger*

POP CULTURE BOOKS

Sandwich, by (Harper, 229 pages)

Since it's set in an idyllic village at Cape Cod, Catherine Newman's novel Sandwich could refer to the town of that name, the oldest on the Cape. It's more of a nod, however, to the "sandwich generation," the term for adults who are caring for their aging parents and their own children.

That's the life stage of the protagonist, Rachel, who (somewhat bewilderingly) goes by the name Rocky, and who, at 54, is "halfway in age between her young adult children and her elderly parents." Rocky has been married nearly 30 years to Nick. "a beautiful man who understands between twenty and sixty-five percent of everything she says."

I will confess right now that I love her, and did by the beginning of the second chapter, when she dubbed a toilet malfunction "Plungergate."

Rocky and her husband have been renting the same modest cottage for a week every summer since the children were young, and as the novel begins, they are headed there again, as Rocky muses on how time whitewashes our perception of experiences, and how a beach vacation is often filled with things that have little to do with the actual beach.

"You might picture the wild stretches of beach backed by rugged dunes or quaintly shingled houses with clouds of blue hydrangea blossoming all over the place. ... Which is funny because most of the time you're actually at the surf shop or the weird little supermarket that smells like raw meat, or in line at the claim shack, the good bakery, the port-a-potty, the mini-golf place. You're buying twenty-dollar sunscreen at the gas station."

On this particular trip, Rocky and her husband are accompanied by their daughter, Willa, who is a junior in college; their son Jamie, who works for a start-up in New York, and his girlfriend, Mya. (Also, the

Catherine Newman family cat, named Chicken — which was the only deeply unrelatable part of the book for me — taking a cat on vacation.) Rocky's parents are due to arrive later in the week Rocky and Nick, who

bicker constantly, are glad to have their children with them in this familiar space, as they

are still navigating their almost empty nest, having to "make nervous small talk over our early dinners, as if we're on an awkward zillionth date at a retirement home."

Their quarreling is obvious to all; at one point, their daughter asks Rocky if something is wrong, but there is also clearly a deep affection between husband and wife that is tested as the week unfolds and a couple of secrets from Rocky's past are slowly revealed. These revelations are related tangentially to a storyline involving Jamie's girlfriend and a health issue she is having. There is a plot here that is thoughtfully crafted, but honestly, it doesn't matter.

Newman is the kind of writer who could write 200 pages about paint drying and keep the reader entranced throughout. She has a gift for taking ordinary experiences and draping them in gorgeous language, the kind that stays with you, as when Rocky reminisces that when her kids were young they would "vibrate with excitement" at the mere mention of a visit to a Cape candy store.

She also has a sharp wit and bestows Rocky with a self-deprecatory wryness that stays at the ready whether she's trying on a swimsuit ("One big wave and my boobs will definitely be celebrating their dangly freedom"; smelling zero SPF tanning oil ("the scent of my future squamous cell carcinomas"); or revisiting memories (" ... Jamie at four, Willa a baby in the sling, me with my permanently trashed perineum").

The joy of Sandwich, in other words, isn't about the plot, but instead about Newman's charming and funny musings about

decades of family vacations at the beach. Much of this book could have been a memoir, and we suspect some of it is, at least the parts about parents and children vacationing together at the beach: the small happiness of rubbing sunscreen on the backs of grown children whose bodies used to be so familiar but are now off limits to you; the weird

time warp that takes over at the beach ("It is always one o'clock when we leave for the beach, regardless of when we start readying ourselves"); the constant scanning for shark fins, ticks and other dangers that never stops no matter how old your children are; and the relative ease of going to be beach with older children as opposed to the physical labor of going to be beach with young ones and their paraphernalia, everyone "breaded with sand."

People who also rent the same beach house every year will also enjoy the observations relative to that - such as Rocky mourning that the old coffee maker has been replaced with something shiny and new, and the family assessing the changes to the house since they'd last been there. (Willa says, "Is it weird that I'm kind of offended when they replace stuff? Like, they didn't even consult with us!")

At the beginning of Sandwich, the novel felt physically thin to me, which sometimes feels foreboding, as if the book didn't ripen and the author didn't take the time to develop it fully. But Sandwich turned out to be short for the same reason that A Christ*mas Carol* is short — the author said exactly what needed to be said, in the ordained time frame, and didn't waste words or the reader's time on the superfluous. Sandwich is a lovely and disciplined novel that accomplishes something remarkable: It's a book about the beach that is too good to be considered a beach read. A -Jennifer Graham



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Harold and the Purple Cravon (PG)

Zachary Levi is a sort of childman whose magical crayon can create anything from airplanes to pie in Harold and the Purple Crayon, a mostly live-action movie.

I guess the book features a Harold who is sort of a PJ-wearing toddler. In the movie, we see that toddler transition to a non-specific-age adult guy (Levi), who hangs out in his two-dimensional world crafting things with his crayon and talking to his friends -Moose (Lil Rel Howery), Porcupine (Tanya Reynolds) and Narrator (voice of Alfred Molina), the "old man" who created Harold and his world.

When the Narrator stops talking to Harold, he decides to go to the Real World and look for his Old Man. He draws a door that says "Real World" and steps through, finding himself a Zachary Levi-ish three-dimensional human in a one-piece outfit. He's accompanied by Moose, who becomes Lil Rel Howery in a brown fleece - though occasionally in times of stress he "mooses out" briefly. Porcupine doesn't make it to the real world right away but when she does she is a British girl with a purple mohawk.

After hugging the first old man he sees and realizing there is more than one old man in the real world, Harold draws himself a tandem bike to make it easier for Moose and him to go search for his specific Old Man. Late-for-work single mom Terry (Zooey

Deschanel) accidentally rams into them and, grateful that these two oddballs aren't litigious, offers them a ride. The ride turns into a somewhat wary offer to stay in the attic of her detached garage for a night after her elementary-school-age son Mel (Benjamin Bottani) reminds her that his late dad always said they should help people who need it. Mel also likes that Harold and Moose are instantly accepting of his invisible friend Carl, kind of a lizard platypus dragon creature. Mel tells them.

Though Terry would like Harold and Moose to exit their lives quickly, Mel is excited to help them on their quest to find the old man - and he thinks these new friends might help cheer his mother up. They head to the library, where snooty librarian Gary (Jemaine Clement), fully absorbed with trying to get his epic medieval fantasy novel published, half-heartedly assists Mel because he hopes to impress Terry. But then he sees Harold "draw" an airplane into existence, puts together the whole "Harold plus purple crayon" thing after finding the original book in the children's section and decides to try to get some of that crayon and its world-building magic for himself.

I feel like there is material to work with here - Harold's imagination-powered crayon, the way imaginary characters (like Mel's Carl or Gary's book's knights) provide something for people working through sadness or difficulties, the parental-like relationship between an author and his character and what it means for a character when the

author is no longer there for him. But I think these concepts become less kid-engaging the more live-action the movie becomes. There are a lot of scenes where everybody on screen is an adult — maybe not terribly mature but still grown-up adult actors not being silly enough to make up for that for a child audience. Moose and Porcupine are fun characters. Levi is fine. Deschanel is sort of a wet blanket like all of these thankless mom roles but the movie overall was missing the magical something that keeps kids watching and not poking their siblings or going to the bathroom as the runtime wears on. The pacing is also off - the movie drags, feeling way longer than its 92 minutes. We spend more time than I think we need to worrying about Terry and her hopes and dreams (kids don't care about mom dreams) and rush through set-piece scenes such as a final battle involving Gary in crayon-created knight mode.

Harold and the Purple Crayon isn't terrible but it also isn't there yet - the concepts and characters feel like they still need some development, especially if the goal is to really enchant a child audience. C+

NITE Natural thing Barefoot Festival returns

One doesn't need to look far to find music and arts festivals that are struggling this year. Several have been cut back or canceled altogether. So it's heartening that the Barefoot Festival, which started in 2023, is returning for a second time. The two-day event's philosophy is back as well: It's about both music and mindfulness, with local acts and movement classes getting equal billing, along with a strong visual arts component.

A key difference between Barefoot and other festivals is its scale, founder Jen Bakalar said in a recent phone interview.

"We're calling it a micro festival, kind of the sweet spot where we're hoping for a few hundred people, everyone feeling comfortable, safe and not too overwhelmed," she said. "It does seem like an antidote to the big festivals, having been to a couple of those this summer."

Performing on Saturday are Freakquonox, Danny Kemps, Ian Galipeau, Yoni Gordon, Superbug, Great Groove Theory, Party of the Sun, Princess Kikou, the Evocatives, and Hug the Dog. On Sunday it's Matt Litzinger, Andrea Paquin, Tyler Allgood, Sara Trunzo, Saguaro, Deep Seize, Kendall Row, Modern Fools, Caylin Costello Band, and DJ Flex. The lineup reflects last year's with several returning artists.

"We kept the music pretty local; I think the farthest act is coming from Maine, and we're bringing in some new singer-songwriters and a few new bands," Bakalar said, adding she's looking forward to the jammy Saguaro. "We wanted ... a good mix of genres and styles so everybody had something that they would want to dance to and listen to. It was nice also to have bands returning, because they kind of know the vibes and people know them."

Organizers also want the festival to be substance-free. There are no alcohol sales, similar to last year, but this time around the message is more forward.

"It's about connection," Bakalar said. "We also want to stress that the venue is a wellness retreat. ... We're not telling people they can't bring alcohol, but we would love for people to not make that the focus."

Opportunities for "intentional movement" abound and are included with festival admission. Bakalar hopes this will inspire

participation. "The spirit of the whole thing is we're connecting and we're sharing," she said. "We're presenting things that maybe people haven't tried yet. Maybe they're like, 'Oh, I don't really do yoga' or 'I don't know what that is,' but this is a way for them to get their toes in. Maybe

it'll be like, 'Wow, that's something that I want to do.'"

She expects a couples massage session led by Alex Lorenz Of Q to be popular. "That's one I'm looking forward to personally," she said. "I think that's that's just like such a cool thing to share dar with people. That one is probably going to be full, we'll have to squeeze people in, but you don't have to sign up."

A variety of art installations are planned, including Sophie Sanders, whose work will be a stage backdrop, a new addition to the festival. Video artist Albie will project his works on a nearby screen. Adam Schepker is back to create interactive works that hew to a playful philosophy stated in his festival bio: "I feel adults lose their childhood sense of fun and joy due to their adult responsibilities and some strange code of conduct that many adults feel tied to."

Attendees should prepare for a few things,

Bakalar cautioned. "Wear your sneakers, be ready to walk," she said, adding that last year's "leave no trace" policy is still in effect.

"If you didn't pre-buy your ticket and you're not spending the night, then you're going to park probably a little bit farther. We heard from people last year

that it's not easy to find, so we're going to do a lot more with putting up signs to get people to the farm. But once you're there, you've got everything you need."

Creme de la Weird

Now, with 160 unique items, she's run out of room to store them. The rarest ones are those with odd shapes, she noted. She's hoping to find a new home for them: "They're clean, washed and in fantastic condition." *Suffolk News, July 29*

Saw That Coming

The Wildernest Home Owners Association in Summit County, Colorado, called the sheriff's office in late July to tattle on a kids' lemonade stand that they said was blocking the road. When officers arrived, KKTV reported, they found the kids were not blocking the road, "but did ask them to move back from the road a few feet for their safety," police said. "The original reporting parties came out and began yelling at the children, claiming they were on private property ... (but officers) determined the property was shared HOA property and because the children's par-



ents are part of the HOA, they had a right to be there," the report went on. *KKTV*, *July 28*

Animal Antics

When Alicia Mastroianni left for work in Brighton, Massachusetts, on July 15, she found her car covered in scratches and a note, she told WBZ-TV. The note was from a neighbor, who wrote, "I just watched and recorded a massive turkey attack your car for over 15 minutes. Sorry you were the target of this turkey rage." "All sides of my car were messed up," Mastroianni said. The Massachusetts Environmental Police said turkey attacks aren't rare anymore in the area. One reason for the assaults is that the birds see their own reflection in the car's surface and attack. They recommend covering your car or yelling to scare turkeys away. *WBZ*, July 25

Awesome!

In Leicestershire, England, a quaint problem is getting a practical solution, the BBC reported on July 25. The North West Leicestershire District Council received a grant of about \$9,300 from Keep Britain Tidy's Chewing Gum Task Force to clean up the discarded wads of gum littering the sidewalks. "Many of the streets, pavements and shopping areas in our towns are affected by discarded chewing gum," said Michael Wyatt of the council, which will also install signs asking people to dispose of their gum properly. The grant is provided by gum manufacturers. *BBC, July 25*

It's Always Something

In 2016, the Scottish government declared it would increase the number of medical school placements because of a shortage of doctors, the BBC reported. Eight years later, professor Gordon Findlater, HM Inspector of Anatomy for Scotland, has declared an unexpected and potentially dire result of the change: a shortage of cadavers for medical students to train on. "This is already having an impact on the surgical colleges (which) are now having to cancel training classes," Findlater said. *BBC*, *July 30*

Mistaken Identity

Gallaghers, a New York City restaurant with a nearly century-long presence on 52nd Street, is decorated inside with photos of celebrities who have frequented the landmark over the many years, the New York Post reported on July 27. One of the signed photos is of Perry Como, a wildly popular singer and television personality during the mid-20th century. But Gallaghers was forced to add a couple of small disclaimers to the frame of Como's photo because of his vague resemblance to disgraced pedophile Jeffrey Epstein, who died in 2019. "THIS IS NOT JEFFREY EPSTEIN," the first plaque reads. "THIS IS PERRY COMO." Gallaghers owner Dean Poll said "hundreds" of customers asked about the photo. NY Post, July 27

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
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
