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

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
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NEWS & NOTES

Pappas runs

Chris Pappas, four-term Democratic congressman for New Hampshire's 1st District, will run for Senate in 2026. The seat won't have an incumbent as Sen. Jeanne Shaheen decided not to run again. Pappas released a video on April 3 on his social media accounts and at his Senate campaign website, chrispappas.org, announcing his campaign.

Five eggs

Three more eggs joined the nest of the peregrine falcons at the Brady Sullivan tower in downtown Manchester — one each on April 1, April 5 and April 7, according to a log recording action at the nest. These new eggs joins the two laid March 22 and March 27. You can watch the couple and their progress at the Peregrine cam at nhaudubon. org/education/birds-and-birding/ peregrine-cam, where the New Hampshire Audubon offers three live views of the nest with support of Peregrine Networks and Brady Sullivan Properties, the website

said. The log also has a link to a document with basic information about the nest and a look back at previous seasons of peregrine falcons that have occupied it and the chicks that hatched there.

Deadline extended



Was it Houston or Florida?



The Big Story: By the time you read this we'll know if Houston won its first ever basketball title or if it's three times this century for Florida. UH got there overcoming a 14-point deficit with

8:17 left to stun Duke 70-67, while Florida's 41-27 second-half blitz erased an 8-point halftime deficit to beat Auburn 79-73. On the women's side after eight hard-to-believe years of UConn not winning, the title is finally back again after crushing South Carolina 72-59 to win their 11th title overall behind 41 from Azzi (Elmer) Fudd (24) and Paige Bueckers (17).

Sports 101: In Nikola Jokic's latest astonishing feat, he posted the third ever 60-point game triple double (61-10-10) game in a two-OT loss to the T-Wolves. Name the other two 60-point triple-d guys.

News Item – Red Sox Week: (1) They won five straight after starting 1-3. (2) Rookie Kristian Campbell entered the week hitting .355 with four doubles, two homers, six RBI. 3) Garrett Crochet was not quite in the groove, but he did go eight while grinding out a needed 6-2 win over Baltimore. 4) The Raffy Devers hysteria after his 0-for-19 start ended when he went 10 for 19 with four doubles and a homer in the winning streak.

News Item – Celtics Update: Having won nine of 10 the C's are heading to the playoffs on a roll.

It should be noted, though, that the teams beaten in their first ever 6-0 road trip during the streak were a combined 78 games *under* .500. So not exactly overwhelming competition. But it still defies logic that at 32-7 they're better on the road than they are on the parquet at 26-13. **Derrick White** buried number 267 vs. Memphis to become Celtics record holder for most ever three-point shots made in one season.

A Little History – 60 Wins: If the C's win two of their last four, they'll be the first Celtics team with back-to-back 60-win seasons since the second Big 3 did it in 2007-08 and 2008-09. Before that it was the Bird-led group doing it three times between 1983-84 and 1985-86, as Larry's group was in the midst of doing it six times in seven seasons. Prior to that the Havlicek-Cowens C's did it twice ('72-'73 and '74-'75). The Russell-era team won 60 just three times despite winning 11 titles in 13 years.

Thumbs Up – Red Sox Owner John Henry: For finally acting like the big market owner he is by spending big on free agent Alex Bregman and by locking up Crochet and Campbell with six- and eight-year deals last week.

Thumbs Down – Bonehead Move of the Week – Jayson Tatum: For not having the discipline to keep it zipped before getting a technical foul at the worst possible time after a 15-point lead had slipped to 9 with 2:55 left to give the **Kevin Durant**-less Suns a free point and the ball on Friday.

Random Thoughts:

With both on hand, Friday was Where Are They Now? Night at TD Garden. The "They" are those not admitting now they were behind the push a few years back for the Celtics to trade **Jaylen Brown** for **Bradley Beal**. Brown dominated him and others by scoring 31 points to Beal's measly one point on Friday. For the year it's Beal 17 per to Brown's 22.6 while also contributing much more on the boards and on D. Reminds all of what **Bill Parcells** famously said: "if you listen to people in the cheap seats, sooner or later you'll wind up there with them." Bullet dodged.

Sports 101 Answer: The other 60 triple double guys are **Luka Doncic** (2022) and **James Harden** (2018).

Final Thought – Parcells Headed to Patriots Hall of Fame: You can be magnanimous and say, thank you. Or you can be combative and say, what took so long?

Either way, thanks to Pats owner **Bob Kraft** for putting their personal history behind them to set in motion the induction of **Bill Parcells** into the Patriots Hall of Fame this summer.

Yes, there was him igniting the border war nonsense. But that was actually a good thing, as it made the Jets-Pats rivalry even better. But in resurrecting a moribund fan base after the disastrous **Victor Kiam** era you can make a case his four-year tenure, which concluded with a Super Bowl trip, makes him the fifth most important Patriot behind **Billy Sullivan**, **Tom Brady**, **Bill Belichick** and **Drew Bledsoe**. So well deserved, Tuna, and good job, Bob, for making it happen.

Two more warm destinations

Avelo Airlines (aveloair.com) announced on April 3 that it has added two new non-stop routes from Manchester-Boston Regional Airport: Wilmington (NC) International Airport (ILM) and the Grand Strand's Myrtle Beach International Airport (MYR). Flights to Wilmington will fly out of Manchester on Thursdays and Sundays. Flights to Myrtle Beach will leave Manchester on Mondays and Fridays. The press release stated that one-way fares started at \$39.

WMUR reported on April 5 that the FAA said an Avelo Airlines flight from MHT to Concord, North Carolina, was illuminated by a laser about 15 miles from the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport on Friday, April 4, around 9:40 p.m. Laser light can interfere with pilots' vision.

QOL score: -1

Comment: "Anyone who shines a laser at an aircraft can face fines up to \$11,000 per violation" and other penalties, WMUR said.

Maple sap thief on the loose

Sugarmomma's Maple Farm in Northwood reported the theft of 1,200 gallons of maple sap from a collection tank back in March. "Between 11 and 5 today someone stole 1,200 gallons of sap on Route 43, between Lucas pond road and Route 4," the farm posted on its Facebook page on March 11. In a Monday, April 7, story in the Union Leader, Sugarmomma's producer Debra Locke said she reported the theft to Northwood's police department. In the story, the police chief is quoted as saying that the case remained open and there were no other reports of sap thefts in the area. Locke said the sap would have produced 30 to 35 gallons of syrup, according to the story.

A gallery's growth

Glimpse in Concord readies new show

For its inaugural show in February 2024, Glimpse Gallery featured four artists hailing from the South, along with two New Hampshire painters and another from Vermont. Glimpse owner Meme Exum always intended for the space, tucked down an alley by the Capitol Building in Concord, to reflect her home region, but knew it would take time.

A little over a year later the seeds Exum and curator Christine Landry-Boullion planted to entice New England artists and buyers to Glimpse are coming to fruition.

"The trajectory's been just straight up, positive, wonderful," Exum said recently. "I now have a lot of folks submitting their work, and it's giving me more flexibility with how I can create the shows."

The choice provided by a deep well of talent allows for shows weighted between up-and-comers and established artists like

RSVP: contact@theglimpsegallery.com Robin Whitney Fairclough, who anchored a successful show in October. It also allows for thematic balance, as with an upcoming exhibit of seven New England artists that includes the colorful abstracts of Rosie Wolf Williams alongside darker works by Talia Dinger. Williams' paintings suggest prairie impressionism, such as the colorful movement in "Breaking Free" and "Lion and the Mouse," an Aesop's fable-inspired piece glowing with childlike energy.

Dinger's mixed media works focus on monochromatic subjects and explore topics like alienation in "I'll Miss You" and the frailty of hope in "Holding On To You," which depicts a person hanging by a thread over a pool of lava or something equally threatening. Her three-dimensional pieces are particularly impressive, such as "Out of Time," an eyeball-shaped, working clock spilling an acrylic tear, and the abstract chest X-ray, "Golden."

Matthew McCain uses gray scale and shadow compellingly in "If You Go, I'll Stay," a foreboding work depicting either an interrogation or an illuminating moment. The main subject's posture is ambiguous; the artist leaves interpretation up to the viewer.

"I love how people can see different things while looking at the same image, and I really try to exploit that in my artwork as much as possible," McCain writes in his bio.

A few of McCain's pieces are adorned with butterflies to convey nostalgia for a bygone time. Similarly whimsical are the line and circle drawings of Amy Moffett. Their simplicity is underscored by her creative process; each is begun with eyes closed, so Moffett can feel the shapes before seeing them. The works are colorful and affordable — all cost under \$100.

Mark Ruddy has shown at the Glimpse Gallery before, but as with other shows, this exhibit will feature all new works.

"Every time it has to be completely different, because I don't want people to see the same thing ever," Exum said. "Every show has to be its own new art and the energy that it carries."

A series of three Ruddy paintings is hung for the upcoming show. Two are of vintage pugilists, arranged around a close-up of the recently renamed Gulf of Mexico on a map. Each picture is covered with multicolored polka dots, a motif he's used in other works to juxtapose a serious subject with something lighter.

Brenda Wilbert is both a mixed media and fine art digital artist. "A Moment of Bliss," a treated photograph of a woman in a river drinking water from her hand, is an example of the latter. Her riotous collages employ

a wide range of textures and colors, from metallic pen lines to painted fabric, watercolors and ink to stunning effect.

The works of Lakes Region artist Benjamin Archibald are a blend of realistic portraits of wildlife, such as the peacock in "Glory," along with patterned portraits done for charity. For the latter, donors purchase one or more fingerprint spots on a piece like "Heliosa," which welcomes patrons at Glimpse's entryway.

"I love what he's doing," Exum said. "He's taking his art to this level where he's making it a communal process...."

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22 years of Highland danceMusic, craft & more at the Indoor Scottish Festival

Claire MacPherson is the President of Scottish Arts and she spoke with the Hippo about their 22nd Annual New Hampshire Indoor Scottish Festival, set to take place at Manchester Memorial High School on Saturday, April 12. "It's actually a three-day event," she said, "but the main festival itself is on the 12th. It'll be open to the public, it's completely free, and there is also some Walker shortbread to be handed out free with the program as well."

"We will have our solo piping competitions, there's a new fiddle competition happening this year, our Highland dance and drumming, and we have over 100 solo competitors. We're going to have 15 pipe bands. The great thing about this being indoors is that the weather can be doing what it likes outside ... In the morning it will be Highland dancing and in the afternoon it's all these pipe bands that come on individually and do their competition sets. It's a really enjoyable afternoon," she said.

The morning will also involve history.

"We're going to have our main history lecture, which is given by a local New Hampshire scholar, Mary Adams, and she's going to be talking about the Scots Irish in New Hampshire from the 1600s to the 1900s. That's going to be fascinating. It's going to be talking about the legacy, why they came from Scotland to Ireland and Ireland to America, specifically to New Hampshire, and what they brought with them, and how they interacted in the making of America," MacPherson said.

No Scottish festival would be complete without the weaving of tales.

"We also have Nancy Bell, who's a renowned storyteller, and she'll be bringing her spinning wheels, so she'll be doing a demonstration on how she does spinning. There's an opportunity to spin your own bookmarks. She'll be bringing her castle with her and telling a lot of Celtic folk tales," she said.

More treats are available for little ones and some will sneakily involve learning.

"We also have another new thing which is a craft called Create Your Own Clan Crest. So, all the clans have their own crests and they have different things on them depending on symbols that were important to the clans like ships or swords or lions, what have you, so it would be an opportunity for kids to create their own one or investigate. We'll also have golf and curling for the kids to try as well. That's new this year, that's exciting. A lot for families and kids. And what's super nice is it's all free."

Participants can also take part in a Scottish-themed raffle where they can win a set of Wallace Bagpipes. Vendors such as Scotlandshop, Thistles and Things, Twisted Creations, Razzbree Dragon Handmades, and Celtic Beat Magazine will be in attendance as well as clans and societies.

"We have the Scots Charitable Society. They are the oldest charity in the Western Hemisphere. They were founded in 1657, so they're absolutely fascinating to talk to, as well as all our clans," she said.

The indoor games continue a long tradition of Scottish heritage.

"Nobody actually knows exactly when the very first Highlands games was, but they're at least 1,000 years old. These are like feats of strength and endurance. It's keeping the clan ready for battle and having their warriors in tip-top shape as it were," MacPherson said. Their outdoor festival takes place in Quechee, Vermont, on Aug. 23.

Thai food like Grandma used to make

New Dessert House satisfies a sweet tooth

Some of Vasita Saktanaset's favorite memories of growing up in Bangkok center around her grandmother's cooking.

"She's 82 years old right now and she's still working," Saktanaset said, "and her hobby is cooking. She actually used to like to open a small street restaurant. It was like a pop-up shop in front of the house. In Thailand you don't have to have a health permit or anything like that. You can open up a restaurant and you can just say, oh today I want to sell something. You just unfold a table and you can sell it right away. She used to do that on and off for her hobbies. She loves cooking. So I grew up with a grandma who liked to feed me with her recipes."

Saktanaset's new restaurant, After Thai Dessert House in Concord, grew out of her love of Thai desserts. After she moved to New Hampshire, she found herself missing the sweets she grew up eating in Bangkok. There are many good Thai restaurants in the area,

Thai desserts.

"I have a sweet tooth," she said, "so I love dessert. I love bingsu [a treat made with shaved ice, condensed milk, and many, many other ingredients] and everything. And there's no dessert shop around here — I mean Asian dessert shop. You have to drive like an hour to Boston to just grab a couple of bites of [Thai] ice cream or anything. It just made me miss my home country a little bit."

Saktanaset's husband and his family own the Siam Orchid Thai Bistro in Concord, and she said he encouraged her to open her own place.

"I saw the potential of this space downstairs from the Siam, and we already rent the whole building. [My husband said,] 'Why don't you use it for something that will earn money?" At first, the idea was to open a dessert space for the restaurant upstairs, Sktanaset said, but soon the space took on a personality of its own, one that reflected hers.

"I just put all my passion in here anything that I like. Sweets, sour foods, some cute stuff, snacks, everything here is something that I like," she said.

Saktanaset noticed that many American desserts lacked complexity.

"The cake and foods you buy in bakeries here are a little too sweet for me," she said. "Asian desserts are less sweet, softer in texture, and everything is light and fluffy."

For instance, After Thai's coconut cake is a moist cake that relies on most of its sweetness from the natural sugars in the coconut and is frosted with

she said, but she found herself craving unsweetened whipped cream, which adds richness and even more moisture to the cake without covering up the flavor of the cream itself.

> Strawberry Roti is a fusion of influences from Thailand, India and the United States.

> "The roti [a flaky fried flatbread] is actually Indian," Saktanaset said. "And vou have condensed milk and strawberry sauce and condensed milk and just the whipped cream. This is street food in Thailand. It's just like you can find anywhere there. They roll it up as a stick, but I think it's a little hard to eat, so we adapted it a little and chopped the roti in pieces."

> After Thai serves a couple dozen desserts at any given time, including bingsu [the shaved ice], custards made with rice or taro, and bubble tea, with large tapioca pearls.

> "I want to have more," Saktanaset said, "but we want to find out what sells. Right now I only pick the ones that I like. Because if I want to have it, I can have it right away. That's the key point of this dessert shop."

What is your 'must-have' in the kitchen?

Butter. I make everything from scratch. menu? And I use real cream in all my chantillys, ... My meringue is from egg whites, but I've separated the eggs. ... But I guess butter would be the first thing.

What would you have for your last meal?

I would have linguine with white clam sauce. My father was a really good cook, a really amazing cook. And he had five daughters, and for our birthdays he would make us whatever we wanted. And every year I wanted his linguine with white clam sauce and he'd always be like 'Jackie, that's so easy! Like the easiest thing to make, come on!' But I told him, 'That's my favorite.'

What is your favorite local place to eat?

That's a tough question. I like Campo Enoteca [in Manchester], though. I just like the vibe in there. I like homemade pasta.

Who is a celebrity you would like to see eating something you've baked?

I love Joanne Chang [celebrity baker and owner of Flour and Myers+Chang in Boston]. I love her. Her recipes are great. ... I also like Paul Hollywood [from The Great British Baking Show] ... [H]e's actually legit, he grew up baking bread with his father. So those are my two top bakers who are alive.

What's your favorite thing on your

Everyone here knows it: pecan sticky buns, which actually use Joanne Chang's brioche recipe. I've tweaked it a little bit here, but really like the pecan sticky buns. My staff all know on the weekend when things are left over you save sticky buns for

What's the biggest food or baking trend that you see in New Hampshire?

Gluten-free, absolutely. ... [Gluten-free baking] has advanced so much with new flour mixtures that I can bake almost anything gluten-free.

What's your favorite thing to cook at

It's not one thing. I get the Milk Street magazine and they have a lot of interesting recipes from all over the world. So I love to pick a recipe like that. For Christmas we always pick a different country and we'll just dive into that country, something different and exotic, usually from overseas. Last week I made this Korean fried chicken from a Milk Street [recipe], and it was so good. It was so good, so satisfying. So if I'm home making something, I try and do something fun and interesting like that.

The Sweet Spot Maple Honey Granola

12 cups oats

4½ cups total raw nuts and/or seeds (chopped pecans and whole pepitas, for instance)

11/2 handfuls whole almonds

3 teaspoons sea salt

11/2 teaspoons cinnamon

11/2 cups organic coconut oil, melted

3/4 cup maple syrup

3/4 cup honey

3 teaspoons vanilla

raisins, dried cranberries, etc.)

Mix oats, nuts, salt and cinnamon.

Mix wet ingredients separately, stir well. Add to oat mixture and stir by hand until all items are coated.

Add to parchment-lined, lightly sprayed full sheet pans (two pans). Spread evenly. Bake in 275°F oven. Stir every 20 minutes until nicely browned, approximately 11/2 hours. Allow to cool.

Place in large bowl when cooled. Add dried 2 cups total dried fruit (dark and golden fruit and mix well. Leave some clumps. Store in airtight container.

Tangelo Madness

I have an understanding. As long as I don't block traffic and stand around telling her dad jokes, she will look the other way as I take more than my fair share of samples:

"So, the police have released some details about that guy who fell to his death off the nightclub roof."

"Oh, yeah?"

"Apparently, not a bouncer."

"Shut up and have some more pretzels." "Don't mind if I do."

Last week, the Sample Lady and I bonded over wedges of tangelo, which sounds like it could be the name of your aunt's latest boyfriend with a pencil-thin mustache and too much gold jewelry but is actually a citrus hybrid of a tangerine and a grapefruit. It turns out that tangelos are insanely delicious — sweet and perfumy, but balanced with enough acidity to make them taste super-juicy.

One thing led to another and I ended up with a bag of them on my kitchen counter. I really, really thought about adapting a lemon

The Sample Lady at the grocery store and cake recipe into a tangelo one, but curiosity got the better of me and I decided to see what fresh tangelo juice tasted like.

Even better.

For reasons known only to fruit geneticists and perhaps Pomona, the Roman goddess of oranges, tangelos, instead of taking after their large, grapefruity parent, are actually a bit smaller than standard run-of-the-mill tangerines and fit nicely into a lemon juicer. Place a fine-mesh strainer over a leftover plastic takeout container and squeeze five or six tangelos through it. The plastic container is flexible enough to allow you to squeeze the sides and pour juice neatly into a cocktail jigger.

Which leads us nicely to the topic of tangelo cocktails.

TWO TANGELO COCKTAILS #1 - A Beer-mosa

4 ounces fresh squeezed tangelo juice beer – a Mexican lager is great for this

This is very complicated, so pay close ular case, dry attention:

Pour the tangelo juice into a pint glass, and top it with beer.

Even though a tangelo looks like a pony in the tangerine stable and tastes really sweet and juicy on its own, there is something about a mild beer that calls to its grapefruit forebears and forges a bond. The slight bitterness of the beer clasps hands with the background bitterness of the tangelo juice and won't let go. The beer tastes juicy, and the juice tastes even more refreshing, if that is possible.

While not as daintily sophisticated as a traditional mimosa, this might be my new brunch go-to.

#2 - Pencil-Thin Mustache

2 ounces vodka

½ ounce Aperol — a ruby-colored, slight-12-ounce bottle of not-too-hoppy pale ly bitter liqueur made from rhubarb and miracles

½ ounce orange liqueur — in this partic-

orange curacao


ounces fresh squeezed tangelo juice

Combine all ingredients with ice in a cocktail shaker. Shake thoroughly.

Strain over fresh ice in a rocks glass. If you are prone to garnishes, a slice or twist of tangelo would not go amiss here.

It is hard to imagine any cocktail more orange than this one. It looks orange. It tastes orange. Not like oranges, mind you tangelos and sunshine are the primary flavor profiles here. The Aperol and curacao add a bit of complexity, and the vodka hides in the background, but the fresh tangelo juice is the star here. Two or three of these could make porch-sitting an event.

I'm not entirely sure if there is an actual tangelo season, but it seems shortsighted not to drink a large number of each of these cocktails while the opportunity presents itself.

Ingrid Laubrock, Purposing the Air (Pyroclastic Records)



Her fully caffeinated handlers describe Laubrock as an "experimental saxophonist and composer interested in exploring the borders between musical realms and creating multi-layered, dense and often evocative sound worlds." In this album the composer pairs single instrumentalists with lone vocalists to futz with the poetry of African-American poet/essayist Erica Hunt, whom I'd imagine might be a little taken aback (or totally not) by this LP, which, at 60-odd short compositions, is a Whitman's sampler of modern alienation, its half-written/half-improvised passages offering seemingly random bite-sized

chunks of psychic turmoil. There are sing-song thingies about kites, general observations on everyday items and such (I lost track), fleshed out musically by an acidic, often noisily played cello for the first 16 pieces (undergirding Fay Victor in noise-scat mode) and a much tamer but equally animated piano, played by Matt Mitchell for the next set, over which our old buddy Sara Serpa unleashes her inner songbird (as in actual bird, seemingly). If you want unapologetically urban ambiance, this is one-stop shopping. **B**+—*Eric W. Saeger*

Art Nation, The Ascendance (Frontiers Music s.r.l.)



Seems to me — mostly because I haven't heard a lot of this kind of stuff — that melodic metal may be starting to move in an emo direction, that is unless this Swedish trio is startlingly original. Here we have the speed of Good Charlotte and the hormone-tugging angst of Trivium without the low end; I suppose the short version is Iron Maiden as its most highly evolved Pokemon character, if that makes any sense. The thing these guys do really well is bring the hooky, operatic melody without making it as indecipherable as those things can get; there's almost no punk element to this tuneage but it's quite

powerfully done. And boy, the sound is pretty huge, which one wouldn't expect from a trio, not that that can't be explained by multi-tracking of course, but yeah, they shoot for the rafters. Past the obligato ballad ("Julia") you'll find songs like "Lightbringer," which is like a cross between King Diamond and Pendulum, i.e. next-gen tech metal. High marks for sure. A+—Eric W. Saeger

- Happy weekend, rock fans, it's your weekly ray of musical sunshine and blind hope for humanity, back with another fresh Dumpster-load of albums from rock stars, nepo babies, comedy bands whose silly monkeyshines amuse unfunny people, and whatever else is in this list of new records coming out on April 11, don't mind the stench, I hope you guys all brought clothespins for your noses! I suppose the tune is nice if you ever wanted to hear Coldplay doing some unplugged twee-Americana hybridization, so if that interests you, by all means, go buy this album and stay away from me on my socials, that'd be great.

You rock fans all remember when this Chicago band filmed the most epic music video of all time for their yelly indie-pop song "This Too Shall Pass," the one where they built a gigantic Rube Goldberg machine (you know, like the kids' game Mousetrap, but a million times more elaborate) in a warehouse and it was awesome, right? Waste Wars. Alexander Clapp (Little, Brown and Co., 341 pages)

When you toss a plastic water bottle in a recycling bin, you're saving the Earth — or so we've been told for



decades. But in recent years a more disturbing story has been emerging, with evidence that much of the stuff in our recycling bins is not being recycled but is being shipped, at significant financial and human cost, to developing nations.

In Waste Wars, journalist Alexander Clapp goes Dumpster diving for the truth, traveling the globe to witness what he calls "the wild afterlife of your trash."

It's a sobering story that's being compared to Rachel Carson's Silent Spring, which in 1962 launched the environmental movement with its examination of the devastating effects of pesticides. But Waste Wars is not so much about how America's garbage is destroying us, but about how it's trashing other countries.

Clapp's introduction includes an astonishing statement: "Since the early 1990s, when your discarded Coke bottle first emerged as a major object of global commerce, China had been the recipient of half the plastic placed into a recycling bin anywhere on Earth." In another decade, he writes, "America's biggest export to China was the stuff Americans tossed away."

But China got fed up and stopped accepting the world's plastic, creating chaos in the global trash trade. "Within months, Greek garbage started surfacing in Liberia. Italian trash wrecked the beaches of Tunisia. Dutch plastic overwhelmed Thailand."

The richest nations soon realized that the poorest could be counted on to take their waste — not just plastic and the remains of incinerated garbage (all that ash has to go somewhere) but also things like sewage sludge. The garbage and waste shipped to other countries is sometimes processed and sometimes repurposed, but often buried or dumped anywhere a truck driver thinks he can get away with it. In some areas sewage sludge has been broadly distributed and then paved over with "roads to nowhere." In one area of Kenya, there are acres of six-story-high trash mountains seeping a poisonous soup that mosquitoes won't breed in.

These sorts of arrangements have

sometimes been brokered by government officials with no say by the citizens affected. In Guatemala in the early 1990s. for example, 200 families were "relocated" from their villages to make way for the processing of sewage coming from Miami, Galveston and other U.S. cities. In Turkey, a Kurdish farmer watched a truck stop outside his citrus groves, dump a load of garbage and light a match, the resulting fire nearly destroying his livelihood in the coming years.

Then there's the e-waste. Clapp travels to a place in Ghana known as Agbogbloshie, which is a slum in which much of our electronic waste winds up. Perhaps, he says, your first cell phone and Game Boy, your DVD player, your college laptop, perished here. He writes about "enterprising young men in Ghana who have spent their lives rummaging through the piles of keyboards, desktop monitors, and smartphones that waste brokers in rich countries have shipped to Agbogbloshie; they are seasoned at restoring these busted electronics back to life — and, on occasion, using them to conduct epic long-range fraud against residents of the countries that sent them."

At the same time, he writes, Agbogbloshie has become "a byword for ecological ruin." Chicken eggs there contain high levels of chemical compounds, making them "probably the most poisonous on Earth."

And yet the enterprise provides jobs. Clapp describes what he calls a "de-manufacturing line" — young men who sit for eight or nine hours a day dismantling and smashing trash: "old ceiling fans, motorcycle mufflers, speaker systems." It is ironic, he observes, that some of the discarded objects being destroyed contain the world's most advanced technology and yet it is backbreaking human labor — "of an almost unimaginably archaic kind" doing the destroying.

Unfortunately, the problems Clapp uncovers have no easy fix, driven as they are by consumer demand for products that don't just become waste themselves but produce waste, are literally wrapped in waste, every step on the way to your house, from their production to their packaging to the cash-register receipt you receive.

The book sometimes feels a bit like a lecture in which Clapp is chastising each of us for the contents of our closets and refrigerators. And yet we needed that Game Boy, didn't we? Yes, water bottles are bad, we get it, but for many of us, so is our tap water. It's easy to see the problem, not so easy to see the solution. Unfortuthe mess we are in.

At the beauty store where my youngest daughter works, they recently tried to reduce plastic bag consumption by discontinuing plastic bags and offering a paper bag for 10 cents. They had to return to plastic bags within a few months because customers were so angry, they would storm out of the store.

Other countries are being more hardnosed. In Indonesia, which is said to be the third largest contributor to plastic in the ocean (behind China and India), stores in Jakarta banned single-use plastic bags five years ago, levying a fine that amounts to \$1,800. Dubai is building an enormous

> Depressingly, Clapp admits at one point, "As long as plastic keeps getting physically diverted by those who consume it the most, the farther from public concern — and political action — it is likely to remain." Waste Wars is an eloquent and deeply researched call to action, even as it's frustratingly unclear about what that action should be. A -Jennifer Graham

Remembering Brooks Young

Friends and bandmates to perform tribute show

The New England music scene suffered a huge loss last October, when Brooks Young was killed in a car accident. The guitarist, singer and songwriter was celebrating a wave of success that included tours with George Thorogood, Sammy Hagar and Three Dog Night, and shows sharing the stage with stars like Bryan Adams and B.B.

Young's career was fueled equally by talent and tenacity.

"If someone called and wanted him for a good gig, he was saying yes," Mike Liane, a bandmate of Young's organizing a memorial show in Concord, recalled recently. "He didn't care, and I say this in a loving way, if the group of people around him were going to be able to do it. He knew he was going to do that gig."

Occasionally, he'd book a show and learn some members of his band had prior commitments, Liane continued. That didn't matter; Young would put together a quick pickup group or, failing that, do the show solo. "Brooks wasn't going to lose an opportunity for anyone ... he just had this confidence and bravery."

Young was a genre-bending rocker who began in the blues. He met B.B. King in his late teens, after the legendary guitarist performed in Manchester on September 11. 2001. Eight years later Young's band opened for King in Concord. Over his career Young would range into rock and pop, without losing his early inspiration, Liane recalled.

"The thing that paints an accurate picture in my mind of what he really liked to do is when we'd play 'Hoochie Coochie Man.' The reason I say that is because it has very true, deep blues roots, but we'd do it in a way that was muscular and a little rock ... he would take all his influences and combine them into every performance."

The April 13 event at BNH Stage is a fundraiser to benefit Young's three children. House band performers span the Brooks Young Band's history, including drummer Blake Wyman, a member of the group's first incarnation. Three other drummers will be on hand as well: Adam Soucy, Rob McCarthy and Dave Lombard, who was behind the kit longest.

"Usually the hardest band member to find is a good drummer, but in this instance we've got four that raised their hand," Liane said. "But outside of the drummers, the lineup's pretty consistent. Charles Mitchell's on bass ... there's myself and Mike Gallant on guitars, and Jeff LeRoy, who played keys with Brooks basically his entire career ... a

Also performing is Charlie Farren, who contributed to Young's second album. "They had a relationship since then, and we're delighted that he's going to play," Liane said. "He's going to do a few songs, and hopefully I can get him on stage to sing some harmony with us or something like that during the set with the Brooks Young Band."

Also appearing are Hank Osborne, Dakota Smart and Valerie Baretto, and there will likely be additional guests.

Liane was a band member late in the game, accompanying him on Three Dog Night and George Thorogood tours from 2016 to 2020, but he'd known Young since high school. He recalls when the two enrolled in an introductory guitar class, even though both were pretty good players at that point.

"We just wanted to play guitar, but we also knew we could get a really good grade," he recalled. "While everyone else was learning 'Mary Had a Little Lamb,' he would show me a Clapton lick, and then I would show him an Angus Young lick. We did that during class."

His old friend never lost the joy of being a musician, Liane continued, recalling another memory that happened a lot.

"Every night standing side stage, he'd put his hands on my shoulders right before we walked out and he'd look me right in the eye and he'd say, Mike, we're going to have a good time tonight," he said. "Every single time that he did this, and it was hundreds of times, but every single time he did this, he was excited, he had a huge smile on his face, and it's the only place on Earth he wanted to be in that moment."

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





The piglets were being denied food and water and were intended to starve to death in the show, called And Now You Care. But animal rights activists, assisted by Evaristti's friend Caspar Steffensen, stole the pigs from the exhibition. "I was very disappointed when Caspar told me ... that he was involved in the theft," Evaristti said. "But then I thought about it for a few hours and realized that at least this way, the piglets would have a happy life." The artist said he'll revive the exhibition but will try to get dead piglets from meat processing plants and present them to the public. "I want to display them in a transparent refrigerator," he said. "I'm willing to pay a high price." Sky News, March 6
